



NEWS FROM THE TATRY DANCERS

This has been a huge transitional year for the Tatry Dancers in Dearborn Heights, MI. Covid aside, Tatry had a change in leadership as our dear Roseann Lackey stepped down as director after more than 30 years of service. We are so grateful for all the hard work she did to keep our group at the high standard for which we have become known. God bless you in your retirement, Roseann, and thank you for taking care of all of us for so many years.

Replacing Roseann in the role of director is Gail Esker. Gail has been a Tatry parent for the last 13 years and stepped in to fill Roseann's incredibly big shoes. Gail, with the help of parents, has already had some creative ideas for fundraisers and events. Since there was no recital or any of the other Tatry end of the year traditions, Gail hosted a picnic

in July to celebrate the dance year. The outdoor celebration included food, lawn games, individual personalized awards for all of the dancers, and a presentation to celebrate Roseann's retirement.

Sadly, Tatry lost one of their nearest and dearest supporters, Father Ed Balazy in July. He was the pastor of St. John the Baptist in Dearborn Heights, that has been home to Tatry for 50 years. We will miss him.

Tatry is also anticipating a change of location for our classes. St. John the Baptist in Dearborn Heights was merged with several other parishes and the building and grounds are being sold. We will soon be moving to St. Sebastian (also in Dearborn Heights) so we decided that our outreach this year would be to collect food items for their food pantry. We had a wonderful response and the parish was grateful for Tatry's generosity.

Classes resumed in October. Dancers started learning the steps for their polkas but did not do any partner work to reduce possible virus transmission. Dance teacher and choreographer Karen Lubiarz started teaching the students their novelty (non-Polish) dances ahead of their polkas since the novelties do not require partners. At the time this goes to press, classes are currently paused due to the current shutdown in

Michigan so the status of our 50th anniversary year recital is uncertain.

The Tatry Dancers have also recently conducted two successful fundraisers. The first was selling squares for the Detroit Lions Thanksgiving Day football game. All 100 squares were sold! This event was followed by a Srodek's pierogi and kielbasa sale-everyone will be receiving their orders just in time for Christmas celebrations!

Happy New Year! As we awaken from the surreality known as 2020, I join the rest of the world and echo the optimism and hope for a healthier, safer, friendlier, and calmer New Year. Vigilance, patience and discipline will still be front and center in the war against Covid-19, but there is a light at the end of the tunnel.

As well-intentioned as New Year's resolutions are, the implication is that something in peoples' lives needs to be changed. When did this notion begin? Well according to my resources, the Babylonians are credited almost 4000 years ago with resolving to pay their debts at the beginning of their year. As the calendar changed, so did the resolutions: there were vows to the gods asking for forgiveness and giving gifts as penance; promises to show kindness; in Medieval Times, the knights reaffirmed their chivalry as a yearly tradition; and getting rid of past bad luck. Interestingly enough, the top two New Year's resolutions of the modern world - eating healthier and exercising more - were not even a consideration.

As I was driving into work one day, I heard something that grabbed my attention on the radio. Bob Sirott from WGN radio referred to an article, "15 Underrated Weight Loss Tips That Actually Work" (MSN Lifestyle, 11/18/2020, Eat This, Not That! Editors) and I thought they were interesting enough to share my favorite ones with you as you begin your New Year's resolution to eat healthier.

- 1. "KEEP IT COOL" at night could help you shed belly fat while you sleep.
- "ORDER A COFFEE BLACK" –
 2 cups a day could result in 4% less belly fat.
- 3. "CHOOSE RED FRUIT". Red fruit is best for weight loss. First and foremost on the list Pink Lady apples, followed by watermelon, red grapes and rasp berries which contain higher level of flavonoids com-

- pounds that give fruit its red color. These calm the action of fat storage genes.
- 4. "TAKE A WHIFF". Smelling fresh green apples or bananas curb the appetite making sugary foods less appealing. The produce makes you subconsciously think about making healthier choices. Shea butterbased lotion could have the same effect.
- 5. "BECOME A CEREAL KILLER". Oatmeal is more satiating than a bowl of cold cereal and can help you slim down. The instant varieties are not as nutritious as the slow cooking one.
- 6. "TAKE A CANDY DAY-DREAM". If you dream about eating candy, you will supposedly eat less of it. (Let me know if this works for you).
- 7. "SCHEDULE A WORKOUT DATE". Invite your spouse or a friend to meet you at the gym to workout (check local mandates) or to take a walk in the park. You can socialize, as you get fit. Teaming up with someone keeps you on track.
- 8. "HOST A MELON BAN-QUET". Melons reign supreme in burning fat and debloating the belly (Side note: melons are also high in fiber, Vitamin C, potassium, and a few B vitamins like B6). Watermelon lowers fat accumulation; honeydew banishes water retention and bloating. (Cantaloupes help to avoid the symptoms associated with vitamin A deficiency, including loss of vision and a weak immune system).
- "PREGAME YOUR DINNER".
 Noshing on an apple or broth-based soup before going to dinner can lower calorie intake by 20% because you should eat less.
- 10. "GET YOURSELF SOME FISH OIL". Rich in Omega 3 fatty

RHODE ISLAND POLONIA SCHOLARSHIP FOUNDATION 2020 AWARDS

The Rhode Island Polonia Scholarship Foundation awarded four high school seniors \$1,000 grants toward their college education. The 2020 recipients are Victoria Jakubiak, Karolina Chrzanowska, Matthew Tactacan, and Nicholas Platek. Due to the Coronavirus and restrictions for social gathering the award ceremony had to be suspended for this year.

The recipients met all Foundation requirements including writing an essay on a selected topic pertaining to Polish culture, history, or music. The 2020 topic focused on researching the efforts made by ordinary Poles to shelter Jews and to help them escape certain death during World War II in German occupied Poland. Under the German occupation, any Pole who was caught aiding Jews was to be executed; and the death penalty was also extended to their family members.

Since its founding in 1978 the RI Polonia Foundation has awarded 351 grants totaling over \$308,000.00. These grants are made possible through the support of private individuals, businesses, and Polish American organizations. In addition to providing financial support, the Foundation strives to promote an appreciation of Polish culture and create an awareness of contributions made by Poland and Polish Ameri-

LEADERS OF THE POLISH ROMAN **CATHOLIC UNION OF AMERICA REV. LEOPOLD MOCZYGEMBA**

Leopold Bonaventure Moczygemba is regarded as the "Patriarch of American Polonia." He was the founder of the oldest permanent Polish settlements in the United States, Panna Maria and Bandera, Texas, the founder of the Polish SS. Cyril and Methodius Seminary in Detroit (1885), one of the early leaders of Polonia. He is considered to be one of the founders of the Polish Roman Catholic Union of America (1873), and was the PRCUA's second President (1875-1880)

Leopold Moczygemba was born on October 18, 1824 in Płużnica Wielka in Upper Silesia.

He was the son of Leopold, an innkeeper, and Ewa (Krawiec), the daughter of a peasant from Boguszyce. His parents had ten children. He spent his childhood in his birthplace and in the nearby village of Ligota Toszecka and attended first the local Catholic schools and then schools in Gliwice and Opole.

In 1843, at the age of 19, Moczygemba decided to become a priest of the Franciscan Order and left for Italy, where on November 17, 1843, he entered the Order of Friars Minor Conventual. He completed his novitiate at the Monastery of Santa Vittoria delle Fratte in Osimo (Province of Ancona). On November 18, 1844, he made his religious vows, and began a peripatetic course of studies for the priesthood. He received the subdiaconate on December 14, 1846 and the diaconate on March 10, 1847. On July 25, 1847, Leopold was ordained a priest in Pesaro. Due to his young age, the prosecutor general of the order had to apply for a dispensation to receive ordination.

He was sent by the Franciscan Minister General Magni to Wuerzburg, Bavaria for further studies. He stayed at the Oggersheim monastery in Bavaria for over four years. There, he met Bishop Jean-Marie Odin of the Diocese of Galveston in Texas, who returned to Europe seeking funds and missionaries to work in his diocese, which encompassed all of Texas. He recruited five Franciscan Minor Conventual priests and one lay brother to serve the German immigrant communities in Texas. Bishop Odin persuaded Moczygemba to undertake a mission in the USA.

He arrived in Texas on September 1, 1852 as a Missionary to serve in the vicinity of San Antonio, first in New Brunfels and later in Castroville.

Fr. Moczygemba became the pioneer of the Polish settlement in Texas. He purchased lands in the Karnes county, near San Antonio, and wrote letters to his family and friends, urging them to come to America. Encouraged by Father Leopold's enthusiastic praise of the new world of freedom and land, over 100 Polish families sold their possessions in Silesia and in October 1854, boarded a vessel and sailed for America. After a nine week journey, they arrived at Galveston in the winter of 1854. The newly-founded settlement was called Panna Maria for "Virgin Mary". Its symbolic beginning was a mass that Fr. Moczygemba celebrated under a live oak tree at the future church site on Christmas Eve of 1854.

It is estimated that at the call of Father Leopold, a total of about 2,300 people came to Texas.

In the spring of 1855, Fr. Leopold, as pastor of Panna Maria, started planning the construction of a church. The construction work on the church began in the summer of that year and it was completed in September 1856. Fr. Moczygemba blessed the church on September 29, 1856. The Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary Catholic Church was the first Polish church in the United States. Rev. Moczygemba served as its pastor until October 1856.

Between 1856-1858 he served as the first Superior of the Conventual Franciscan Missionaries in Texas.

In the summer of 1858, he traveled to Rome to secure more helpers for the Texas missions and to obtain permission for the organization of a Franciscan province in the United States. In October of 1858, he was appointed the first Commissary General of the new Commissariat for Conventual Franciscans headquartered in New York. At his request, he was relieved from his duties in June 1866, and resumed his duties as a missionary friar, ministering in Syracuse, Utica, and Oswego, New York.

In 1868, He opened the first Polish Parochial

School at St. Stanislaus Parish in Milwaukee, WI.

In 1869, he wa an Apostolic Confessor at the First Vatican Council in Rome. After returning to the United States in 1870, Fr. Leopold devoted himself to parochial work in the diocese of Alton (now Springfield), IL, then to Litchfield, IL, and in November 1873, to Terre Haute, IN, and then, to St. Peter's parish in Louisville, KY.

In 1873, Fr. Moczygemba was the chairman of the convention called in Detroit, at which the Polish Roman Catholic Union of America was founded.

After the third PRCUA Convention in June, 1875, in Milwaukee, Fr. Moczygemba, when he was elected the president of the organization, began to devote time, energy and personal funds to the realization of the Union's educational program. In 1874, at the fourth PRCUA Convention, a decision was made to build the new college in a new Polish colony in Nebraska under the sponsorship of the Union. Fr. Leopold purchased 400 acres of land near North Loup (now Elbe) River in Nebraska for the site of the future school. In 1879, he personally submitted two petitions to Pope Leo XIII and received Papal approval of the projected Polish college.

While in Rome, he also submitted a personal petition to the Sacred Congregation of Bishops and Regulars, asking permission to leave the Franciscan Order and join the Resurrectionist Congregation, founded by Polish (cont. on pg. 18)

100 WAYS JOHN PAUL II CHANGED THE WORLD

100 Ways John Paul II Changed the World. Patrick Novecosky. Our Sunday Visitor Inc., 2020. 191 pp. \$16.95.

Two pillars in the lives of most members of the Polish Roman Catholic Union and of readers of Naród Polski are their Catholic faith and their Polish heritage. This book is sure to strengthen both these pillars.

As the title announces, this book lists one hundred aspects, selected by the author, from the life and papacy of St. John Paul the Great that have significantly changed the world—including the Roman Catholic Church and the lives of countless millions of

The list begins with item one

hundred and works its way down to item one. Furthermore, the list is organized in groups of ten, the first item in each group is given a pageand-a-half to two pages in length, the remaining nine items in each group are limited to a single page. The final ten items of the list, numbers ten through one, are also longer in length and address topics identified by various scholars and authors who have studied John Paul's life and legacy and many of whom knew the Pope personally. These last items on the list are Devotion to Mary, Unpacking Vatican II, Culture of Life, World Youth Day, Luminous Mysteries of the Rosary, the Catechism of the Catholic Church, the Fall of Communism, Theology of the Body, Divine Mercy, and The New Evangelization. It is also worth noting, as Dr. Paul Kengor does in his Foreword, that the first and last

items in the list of one hundred have a particular significance since Religious Freedom, the first item listed, was regularly stressed by John Paul as "a cornerstone of human rights" and is now under attack in many countries, including by many in the United States, and since Evangelization, the final item, was identified by John Paul as the very reason the Church exists.

Although a couple of the one hundred items listed as worldchanging are rather a stretch (#74 The Popemobile and #38 Love of the Circus), the list is well conceived and extremely well researched. Each entry is supported by quotations from the books, encyclicals, Apostolic letters, audiences, addresses, and homilies of Pope John Paul II and supported by observations from leading scholars of John Paul and of Catholic tradition and history-figures like George Weigel, Paul Kengor, Avery Cardinal Dulles, James Hitchcock, and others. Novecosky, who himself met Pope John Paul II five times, demonstrates an impressive familiarity with John Paul's papacy and those who have studied it.

An additional benefit of the book is that about ten percent of the listed items deal directly with Poland (e.g., #2 Divine Mercy, #4 The Fall of Communism, #27 Maximilian Kolbe, #28 Faustina Kowalska, #30 1979 Visit to Poland, #36 Our Lady of Czestochowa, #58 Defending Copernicus, #86 Solidarity (Solidarność) Trade Union, #87 Friendship with Cardinal Stefan Wyszyński, and #91 Impact on Poland); but virtually every item sheds light on John Paul's identification with the land of his birth and its influence on him and his papacy.

St. John Paul the Great made the world a better place; and this book, in its own modest way, continues his work of evangelization and spreads his message of hope. The book can be used in several ways. It can serve as a quick but preliminary reference tool for an overview of the many noteworthy aspects of the life and papacy of Karol Wojtyła; it can serve as an opportunity to reflect on this remarkable man and to meditate on the messages he taught by word and example; but, at some point, it should also be read from cover to cover to get a better appreciation of the many ways John Paul changed the world—and is still changing lives

100 Ways John Paul II Changed the World is, I am confident, a book that you will enjoy reading, one that will surely leave you better informed, and one that will strengthen your Catholic faith and your Polish heritage.

POLAND'S ROBERT LEWANDOWSKI – WORLD'S BEST FOOTBALLER

Polish star striker Robert Lewandowski has been named the world's best player in the world's most popular sport by FIFA, the international soccer authority. With 63 international goals to his credit, the 32year-old Pole beat out such all-time

football greats as Argentina's Lionel Messi and Portugal's Cristiano Ronaldo for the title. Lewandowski, who play for Germany's Bayern Munich, has scored 250 goals in the Bundesliga (Germany's major league) and has won the league's Top Scorer Award five times. He is also the alltime top scorer for Poland, has been named Polish Player of the Year a record eight times, and in 2015 won the World's Top Goal Scorer Award. He was awarded four Guinness World Records after scoring spectacular five goals in only nine minutes against Germany's Wolfsburg team in 2015. Lewandowski is the first Polish athlete to win a "world's greatest" award since 1974, when that title went to runner Irena Szewińska in the track and field category.



The Twelfth Day of Christmas, 2021

PRCUA One of the beautiful Polish customs of the Christmas Season which we are now celebrating is the blessing of our homes with incense and the marking of our doors with chalk on the Feast of the Epiphany or Three Kings. This Feast on January 6th marks the Twelfth day of Christmas and is often referred to as "Little Christmas". In Poland, it is now a national holiday and it continues to be one of the Holy Days of Obligation in the Catholic Church there. It is on this day that we commemorate and celebrate the visit of the Three Magi to the newborn King, revealing Him to be the Messiah of all nations.

The word Epiphany means to make manifest and thus, the Magi, who were not of Jewish lineage, recognize Him to be the One foretold by the prophets. Jesus is now revealed to be the Savior of all by their presence in Bethlehem. The beautiful Christmas *kolęda*, 'Mędrcy Świata' reminds us of this visit as it tells the story of what happened that day and the jealousy and rage of King Herod.

Since many of our parishes offer blessed chalk and incense to be taken home and used in a home blessing, I thought I would share with you this simple version to help you revive or continue a custom that still has great meaning today.

After marking the inside lintel of main doors of your home with 20 + K.M.B. + 21, all make the sign of the cross and the head of the house reads the following prayer:

The Three Magi:

Melchior,


Balthasar, followed the Star of God's only begotten son who came to us 20 Two Thousand and

21 Twenty-one years ago

May Christ bless our home and protect all who come and go through the doors of our home and remain with us in each and every day of this new year, 2021. Amen.

This feast ends the traditional Twelve Days of Christmas. It also begins the older tradition of the Roman Catholic Church in celebrating the Christmas Season for a full forty days, up until the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord in the Temple on February 2nd, which is commonly referred to as Can-

dlemas Day. In the Catholic Church today, the Christmas Season liturgically closes on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord on January 10, 2021. It is my wish that each and every day of this 'Season of Love', from Christmas Day until Candlemas Day, February 2nd, brings you closer to the One of whom the angels sing, Jesus the Christ, the word made flesh in the glory of the Incarnation!







emigres in 1842. Pope Leo XIII granted the request under certain condition, and on January 23, 1980, Fr. Moczygemba made his religious profession with the Resurrectionists and left Rome, returning to America as a member of the Congregation of Resurrection.

In May 1882, Fr. Moczygemba left Wisconsin and moved to St. Alphonsus parish in Lemont, IL. In 1884, thanks to his efforts, Saints Cyril and Methodius parish was built in Lemont.

As a result of various concerns, mostly against the location of the projected Polish college and seminary in Nebraska the project was stopped. Other sites (Detroit, Chicago and Milwaukee) were suggested as more suitable locations for the proposed institution. Fr. Joseph Dabrowski was made the executor of Fr. Moczygemba's project, lands in Nebraska were sold, and the establishment of the Sts. Cyril ad Methodius Seminary was finally realized by Fr. Dabrowski in 1885 in Detroit, MI (later moved to Orchard Lake, MI).

In 1888, with his health declining, Fr. Moczygemba took permanent residency in Detroit, and after he petitioned Rome, he became a diocesan priest with no obligations toward any religious order. For a year he was the pastor of St. Mary's at Parisville, MI and then for several months, he officiated at St. Stanislaus Parish in Hilliards, MI.

Fr. Leopold Moczygemba died on February 23, 1891 in Detroit and was buried in Mount Elliot cemetery. On October 13, 1974, his remains were reinterred in Panna Maria, TX. He established number of parishes, founded shools, was one of the founding members of the Polish-American Association, and performed his ministry serving Polish German, Italian, English, Czech, and Spanish immigrants.

ROK 2021 OGŁOSZONY ROKIEM KARD. STEFANA WYSZYŃSKIEGO

Sejm Rzeczypospolitej Polskiej przyjął w dniu 27 listopada 2020 r. uchwałę, na mocy której postanowił, że 2021 rok będzie Rokiem kardynała Stefana Wyszyńskiego.

W 2021 roku przypadają dwie ważne daty związane z kard. Wyszyńskim – to 120. rocznica jego urodzin i 40. rocznica śmierci. Kościół katolicki oczekuje również na uroczystość beatyfikacyjną Prymasa. Uzgodniona ze Stolica Apostolską na 7 czerwca 2020 roku została bezterminowo zawieszona. Nowy termin zostanie ustalony i ogłoszony po ustaniu pandemii

Inicjatorem tej uchwały był Senat Uniwersytetu Kardynała Stefana Wyszyńskiego w Warszawie. W uzasadnieniu decyzji podano: "Sejm Rzeczypospolitej Polskiej przekonany o szczególnym znaczeniu osoby kardynała Stefana Wyszyńskiego dla poszanowania godności człowieka i wolności, szacunku do Ojczyzny i budowania wolnej i niepodległej Polski, ustanawia rok 2021 - Rokiem kardynała Stefana Wyszyńskiego".

Sejm podjął także uchwały ogłaszające rok 2021 m.in. rokiem Konstytucji 3 Maja (w 230. rocznicę uchwalenia), Cypriana Kamila Norwida (w 200. rocznicę urodzin), Krzysztofa Kamila Baczyńskiego (w 100. rocznicę urodzin), Tadeusza Różewicza (w 100. rocznicę urodzin) i Stanisława Lema (w 200. rocznicę urodzin) oraz Rokiem Powstań Śląskich (w 100. rocznicę III powstania śląskiego) oraz Rokiem Pracowników Ochrony Zdrowia.

Również litewski Sejm ogłosił rok 2021 Rokiem Konstytucji 3 Maja i Zaręczenia Wzajemnego Obojga Narodów.
