that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

The Declaration of Independence, was an official act taken by all 13 American colonies in declaring independence from British rule. Signed by 56 members of the Second Continental Congress and adopted on July 4, 1776, it established the ideals and goals of the American nation, making the United States a role model for other countries in their pursuit for freedom.

Originally authored by Thomas Jefferson, the Declaration of Independence was then revised by Benjamin Franklin. John Adams, and Jefferson. The final draft was adopted on July 4, 1776. The actual signing of the completed document took place on August 2, 1776 in Philadelphia, and is one of the most important days in American history. Since 1938, Independence Day has been celebrated as a paid federal holiday.

The Fourth of July is considered the birthday of the United States of America. Happy 245th Birthday America!

FLAG DAY CELEBRATION AT THE PRCUA HOME OFFICE

The employees of the Polish Roman Catholic Union in America and the Polish Museum in America paid tribute to the American flag on Monday, June 14 - which is the anniversary of the Flag Resolution of 1777. On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress passed the Flag Resolution which stated: "Resolved, That the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation."

Taking advantage of the beautiful weather, the program started outdoors around the American flag. The participants were welcomed by PRCUA President James Robaczewski, who also intoned the American anthem. The Pledge of (Cont. on pg. 2)





NEW ENGLAND FRATERNAL ALLIANCE 2021 SCHOLARSHIPS

Award: Two \$1,000 scholarships will be awarded by the New England Fraternal Alliance to students in their sophomore, junior, or senior year in college or in graduate school. The first is named in memory of Pearl Plante, a loyal and tireless worker for the New England Fraternal Alliance; the second is named in memory of Normand Ouellette, a past president and heart of the Alliance.

Eligibility: Applicant must be enrolled as a full-time student in an accredited college/university graduate school.

Applicant must be a resident of New England and a member (or a son /daughter of a member) of a fraternal benefit society that holds a membership in the New England Fraternal Alliance.

Applicant must have a cumulative grade average of at least 2.0 (on a 4.0 system). Transcript of grades from spring 2021 semester must be submitted with application.

Application for scholarship award must be completed in its entirety and submitted by September 1, 2021. Incomplete and/or late entries will be disqualified. There will be absolutely no extension of the deadline.


Procedures: The \$1,000 scholarship awards will be paid directly to recipients.

Criteria to be used in judging: overall merits of applicant, cumulative grade average, college activities/ honors, community activities, financial need and essay content.

A GOLDEN CELEBRATION **OF DANCE: DONNA M. SKURSKI**


2021 marks Donna Skurski's fiftieth anniversary as a choreographer and dance teacher with PRCUA as well as 45 years with the PRCUA Opole Dancers in Warren, MI. From 1971 to 1985, Donna served as the choreog-

rapher and dance teacher of the PRCUA Gwiazda Dance School.

Donna began dancing as a young child with a Polish dance group down the block from where she lived. Her love of dance continued into college where she earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in dance and theater from Marygrove College, where she was a member of their resident dance company, Dance Detroit.

Although Donna loved to perform in ballets presented by Marygrove, her true love of dance was performing the national and regional dances of Poland. This love was so great that she traveled to Poland to further her studies and to study under the dance masters themselves, spending several summers in Lublin, Poland.

Her vast knowledge of Polish dance and culture prepared her to become artistic director of the Wawel Folk Ensemble in January of 1992. The troupe participated in the triennial International Festival of Polish Folk Dance Ensembles in Rzeszów, Poland, eight times in the years 1980-2011. In 2018, Donna travelled to Po-



Donna received the General Casimir Pu-

laski Medal of Honor (given annually by the Central Citizens Committee of Detroit, MI) for her contributions to Polonia and preservation of Polish culture in 1996. In 2003, Donna and her husband Tom received the Polish Heritage Award, presented by the Polish Heritage Committee of St. Hyacinth's Parish. Also in 2003, she was selected by the Warren Cultural Commission to receive the Fine Arts Award for Dance. Representing the Wawel Folk Ensemble, Donna has held several offices on the board of directors of the Polish Folk Dance Association of the Americas. Donna currently serves as its Sergeant at Arms. Over the past 38 years, she has participated in all the Polish dance workshops held throughout North America.

In addition to her current dance responsibilities, Donna is a full-time substitute elementary school teacher for the Roseville School District.

On behalf of the PRCUA, we thank Donna for her GOLDEN years of service to the Polish American Community and wish her continued success as a promoter of Polish folk dance culture. Sto Lat!



Consulate General of the Republic of Poland in Chihosted a cago celebration for the 30th anniversary of the establishment of the Visegrad Group - V4 and the Polish Presidency of the Visegrad Group. The event took place on Thursday, June 6th and was attended by representatives of the diplomatic corps, state and city representatives, repre-

sentatives of the Illinois Department of Commerce & Economic Opportunity, World Business Chicago (WBC), Chicago Sister Cities International (CSCI), Chicagoland Chamber of Commerce (CCC), SelectChicago, Polish American Chamber of Commerce (PACC), LOT Polish Airlines, PGS Software, and leaders of Polish, Hungarian, Czech and Slovak diasporas in the United States.

The program was conducted by Małgorzata Bąk-Guzik, Acting Consul General of the Republic of Poland in Chicago. Guest speakers were: Tamas Kovacs, Consul General of Hungary in Chicago; Jaroslav Kantůrek, Consul General of the Czech Republic in Chicago; Rosemary Macko Wisnosky, Honorary Consul of the Slovak Republic in Chicago, and Michał J. Rzeźnik, Head of the Foreign Trade Office in Chicago, Polish Investment & Trade Agency (PAIH) and the event co-organizer.

Consul Bąk-Guzik extended a special welcome to Svetoslav Stankov, Consul General of Bulgaria in Chicago; Serhiy Koledov, Consul General of Ukraine in Chicago; Robert Dumitrescu, Deputy Consul General of Romania in Chicago; Tomáš Trnka, Trade Commissioner from the Consulate General of the Czech Republic in Chicago; and Andras Juhasz, Trade Commissioner from the Consulate General of Hungary in Chicago.

The artistic program was presented by the Capriciosso String Quartet, consisting of professional musicians born in Poland, Romania and Moldova: Anna Bivol (violin), Fabian Ularu (violin), Constantin Postolach (viola) and Patrycja Likos (cello). The program included pieces by Dworak, Monti, Machajdik, Chopin, Smetana, Bartok, and Brahms, and a performance by Polish jazz vocalist Grażyna Auguścik.

The Visegrad Group was established as an alliance of originally three, later four countries for the purpose of furthering their European integration as well as advancing their military, economic and energy cooperation with one another.

The Visegrad Group (or the "Visegrad Four" or simply "V4") reflects the efforts of the four Central European countries—the Czech Republic, Hungary, Poland, and Slovakia—to work together in a number of fields of common interest within the all-European integration.

The first high-level summit was held in the town of Visegrád on February 15, 1991. The place was selected to symbolically connect the summit to the meetings of three kings in Visegrád in 1335 and 1336 which had been the result of lengthy and complex diplomatic efforts at that time and can be regarded as one of the earliest examples of regional cooperation in Central Europe. THE 50TH ANNUAL DETROIT TIGERS **POLISH AMERICAN NIGHT**

The 50th annual Detroit Tigers Polish American Night took place on Friday, May 28, 2021 at Comerica Park in Detroit, MI. The Tigers played against the New York Yankees. The weather was beautiful and in the 80s the week before the game. However, the day of the game, the temperature was in the very cold 40's and spectators were dressed in winter coats, hats, gloves and scarves.

Originally, this special anniversary was to take place in 2020 but Covid-19 caused its cancellation. When Tigers' management contacted co-chairs Wally and Christopher Ozog, it was decided to set a date for 2021 with the hope that things would be back to normal.

The initial program was much different than previous years. As it

got closer to the game, that program also changed. At first, the dancers were to perform in the concourse. However, the day of the game, no dancers in colorful costumes were dancing to lively Polish music in this area. Instead, a few photos of dancers from previous years with background music were shown on the big screen. This was not the same as when hundreds of dancers twirled about on the entire field for a much longer period of time.

In years past, veterans, Polish and American scouts and the PRCUA Zakopane Dance Ensemble proudly displayed the flags on the field. This year, Taylor Withers and Ryan Ozog, winners of the Polish American Night Art Contest, held the Polish flag near Kaline's Corner.

Tigers' management said that the singing of the national anthems and the ceremonial 1st pitch were to be videotaped prior to the game and then shown on the big screen. After outside arrangements were made, it was changed and both were done in person before the game and at home plate.

Robert Szczublewski, who has sung the anthems since 2008, and Ania Toboy, who started to participate as a vocalist in 2019, had the privilege of singing the Polish and American national anthems once again. Brian Malski, a member of Friends of Polish Art and a long time supporter of Polish American Night, was given the honor of throwing out the ceremonial 1st pitch. However,

his catcher was not a Tigers player but was PRCUA #718 member Kenny Germain, a student at Madonna University, a former baseball player for Bishop Foley High School and a winner of the Detroit Tiger Polish American Night Art Contest.

PRCUA Society #1593 Vice President and co-chair of Polish American Night Christopher Ozog recognized the limited number of dignitaries who were present. Instead of being introduced at home plate, these representatives proceeded from the tunnel near Kaline's Corner where the dancers usually lined up before coming onto the field. The on-field representatives were Wallace M. Ozog (National PRCUA President Emeritus, President, PRCUA #1593, and co-chair of Polish American Night for 16 years), Robert Bielenda (National PRCUA Vice President Emeritus), Donna Skurski (choreographer of PRCUA Opole Dancers, one of the longestserving PRCUA choreographers), Thomas Skurski (director of Wawel Dance Ensemble, one of the 1st dance groups to perform at Polish American Night in 1971 and who threw out the 1st pitch in 2015), Barbara Martin (financial secretary of PNA Lodge 53, past director of PNA Centennial Dancers who participated in PAN for 27+ years), Ron Martin (president of PNA Lodge 53), Donna Bielecki (Polish American Congress, Michigan Division, vice president of American affairs), David Jansen (chairman, National Polish-American Sports Hall of Fame), Honorable Mayor Karen Majewski (mayor of Hamtramck, Michigan), Rick Lapham (president of Friends of Polish Art, sponsor of the 50th Anniversary of Polish American Night Art Contest), Barbara Ozog (activity director of PRCUA #1593 and behind-the-scenes volunteer at PAN), Cindy Cooper (member of PRCUA #1593 and behind-the-scenes volunteer at PAN), Taylor Withers (winner of the 50th Anniversary of PAN Art Contest, PRCUA #1593 Scholarship Recipient) and Ryan Ozog (winner of the 50th Anniversary of the PAN Art Contest).

Although music from the popular polka bands was not resounding throughout the stadium prior to the game and the beautiful fireworks display did not grace the skies at the end of the game, the Tigers were victorious over the Yankees, 3-2 in ten

The 50th Anniversary of the Detroit Tigers Polish American Night will go down in history as being different from the first forty nine years of its existence. However, through the history, photos, art work and memory ads included in the book titled, 50 Years of Polish Pride with the Detroit Tigers (1971-2019) +2021, memories of this celebration of our Polish heritage at the ball park will not be forgotten. Hopefully, there will be more Detroit Tiger Polish American Nights as it was. Sto Lat!

This year Tigers' management did not promote a souvenir item so the coordinator of this event, PRCUA #1593 purchased t-shirts commemorating these 50 years. A limited number is still available. LEADERS OF THE POLISH ROMAN CATHOLIC UNION OF AMERICA WOJCIECH JĘDRZEJEK

Wojciech Jędrzejek (aka Jendrzejek) was the 6th president of the Polish Roman Catholic Union of America (1887-1888).

Wojciech Jędrzejek was born in 1850 in Wencborg (Więcbork) a town in an area annexed by Prussia in the late 18th century. He came to Chicago in 1869 at the age of 19.

After arriving in the United States, he worked as a laborer in a timber yard. Together with his brother-in-law, Mr. Paszkiewicz, they opened a grocery store. Later, he opened and independently ran two grocery stores in his homes on Holt Ave. and Dickson St.

In 1872, Jędrzejek married Józefa Rozmarynowska. They had eleven children: Anna, Jan, Franciszka, Leona, Franciszek, Elżbieta, Helena, Maryanna, Edward, Jerzy and Gertruda. Jan, his oldest son, became a priest.

Jędrzejek's professional work did not prevent him from fulfilling the duties of both a good parishioner and a good Polish American. He helped to found the Polish Patriotic Organization (*Organizacja Patriotyczna Polska*) and the Polish League (*Liga Polska*). He actively participated in the founding and development of the parish of St. Stanisław Kostka in Chicago and establishing societies and various organizations.

He was one of the first founders of the Polish Roman Catholic Union in America, where he held the office of president for one term, and was elected its treasurer in 1885, 1887, and 1895 (for three consecutive terms.)

He was the treasurer of the Polish Publishing House in Chicago (*Spółka Wydawnictwa Polskiego w Chicago*), which published *Wiara i Oj-czyzna*, the official organ of the PRCUA, *Dziennik Chicagoski*, *Kro-pidło*, and other publications.

At the 15th PRCUA Convention in 1888 in Detroit, Jędrzejek proposed that delegates could represent more than one society (representation of societies apart from their own was to be limited only to financial matters, and they had the right to cast only one vote when voting). His proposal was approved.

In 1891, Polonia in the USA celebrated the 100th anniversary of the May 3rd Polish Constitution combined with the convention of the Polish American organizations. Woj- ciech Jędrzejek was elected as a member of the "committee of seven"

(other members were: Szczęsny Zahajkiewicz, Antoni Rudnicki, Tomasz Królik, Jan Manna, Jan Arkuszewski, Sylwester Biniak) to organize the national Polish American convention.

On October 20, 1892, he was one of the marshals at the combined celebrations of the 400th anniversary of the discovery of America and the inauguration of the Columbian Exposition. He was also a member of the Polish American Reception Committee for Polish guests coming to the 1893 exhibition (*Polsko Amerykański Komitet Recepcyjny dla gości polskich przybywających na wystawę 1893 r. do Chicago*) on the occasion of the Polish Day held during the Columbian Exposition.

In 1893, Jędrzejek was a member of the organizing committee of the 20th PRCUA Convention. At the convention, he was chosen to be one of the PRCUA representatives (together with Piotr Kiołbassa and Klemens Beliński) at the General National Exhibition (*Powszechna Wystawa Krajowa*) to be held in 1894 in Lviv. He was also one of the PRCUA representatives to Kościuszko Uprising anniversary celebration held in Chicago on May 3, 1894.

At the 21st PRCUA Convention held in August of 1894, Jędrzejek was appointed a member of the Constitution Amendment Committee.

He was a member of the Education Department established by *Liga Polska* in 1895.

On September 11, 1904, the unveiling of the Tadeusz Kościuszko monument took place in Humboldt Park in Chicago. Jędrzejek was the treasurer of the monument committee.

For many years, Jędrzejek was the treasurer of the Construction and Loan Society (*Cont. on pg. 15*)



POLISH NEWS **BYTES**

Unknown "dinosaur" species discovered in Poland - A team of paleontologists from the Polish Academy of Sciences have discovered a new species of aetosaur in southwest Poland. The aetosaur, whose name translates from the Greek as "eagle-lizard," was a prehistoric reptile resembling today's crocodiles. The specimen was found among fossils of vertebrates from about 210 million years ago, including lungfish and turtles. They were unearthed at an archeological dig in the village of Kocury in Opole voivodeship. The scientists managed to find the jawbone and fragments of the protective armor of the new aetosaur, which was named Kocurypelta silvestris (Kocury-armored forest dweller). The new species "looked like a cross between a crocodile, an armadillo and a wild boar," remarked Łukasz Czempiński, one of the scientists, "They were about three meters (10 feet) long and most of them were omnivorous."

Centaurus Foundation boasts Europe's largest horse shelter - Poland's horse population has dropped from 329,000 in 2002 to an estimated 180,000 at present. Trucks and tractors have largely replaced the draft horses of yesteryear, and racing thoroughbreds also become useless if they break a leg or simply get old and decrepit. The non-profit Centaurus Foundation, headquartered in the SW city of Wrocław, has made it its mission to save as many such equines as possible by arranging adoptions with horse-lovers who will let the animals live out their days in relative peace and comfort. So far the donor-financed foundation has saved 1,100 horses from the butcher's knife and cleaver. Those it couldn't help got sent as roasts, steaks and hamburger to such horsemeat-loving countries as Italy, France, Belgium and Holland. Poles have an aversion to horsemeat and many view the "koń" (horse) as a noble beast that has played an important part in their nation's heritage.

Polish company starts production of revolutionary solar panels - A Polish company called Saule has opened a 5,000 square meter (540,000 sq. foot) factory to produce what it calls "a revolutionary, new type of solar panels." These are inkjet-printed, ultra-thin, lightweight and flexible solar panels coated with a thin layer of perovskite, a calcium titanium oxide mineral which can be synthetically manufactured. The award-winning technology was developed by Saule founder, chief technologist and CEO, physicist Olga Malinkiewicz. The innovative technology generates energy not only from sunlight but also from artificial light, which means perovskite panels can be installed on building exteriors and used to generate electricity on the inside and even in space satellites.

"Trees Unite Us" afforestation campaign continues apace - A campaign known as "Trees Unite Us" launched earlier this year hopes to have 33% of Poland's territory afforested. Pioneered by Poland's Ministry of Climate and Environment, it is under the personal patronage of President Andrzej Duda. On the front line are foresters who have been trying for decades to rebuild Polish woodlands which have been destroyed by war and overexploitation. The aim of the campaign is to plant 1,000 trees per minute. With woodlands covering some 29 percent of its territory, Poland already ranks among Europe's most forested countries. But, like everywhere else, developers are constantly on the lookout for woods and meadows in or near metropolitan areas they can cover with asphalt, malls and condos.

French Polonian teen forces publisher to correct falsehood - Jakub Vaugon, who has a Polish mother and a French father, has managed to get a publisher to correct misinformation contained in a history textbook. It had falsely claimed that Poles worked as auxiliary staff at Germany's Treblinka death camp in Nazi-occupied Poland. Jakub's parents contacted the Treblinka Museum which confirmed the claim to be an historical error and called on the publisher to correct it. The French publisher apologized and said the correction would appear in a new edition of the book. The Germans murdered up to 900,000 Jews and

some 2,000 Gypsies at Treblinka, their second largest extermination camp on Polish soil after Auschwitz-Birkenau.

10-day quarantine for unvaccinated travelers from outside Schengen zone - Uninoculated travelers arriving in Poland from outside the European Union's Schengen free-travel zone, including Americans, will be placed under a 10-day quarantine. The new regulations do not apply to people fully inoculated against the coronavirus with a vaccine approved by the European Union. The quarantine requirement can be lifted after seven days for those who can produce a test result showing they do not have COVID-19. The Schengen area comprises 22 European Union countries plus Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway and Switzerland. In normal times, citizens of those countries could travel across borders without documents or border checks, although some restrictions have been re-introduced during the pandemic. The appearance in the UK of a new and highly infectious Delta strain of the virus has prompted Polish officials to introduce a seven-day quarantine on visitors from the UK where it has taken hold.

Baltic Pipe gets environmental goahead to continue construction - In May, Denmark's Environment Protection Agency stopped the construction of a section of Baltic Pipe, the Norway-Poland gas link, claiming it endangered a threatened field mouse

and bat species. The Baltic Pipe Project was launched to pipe Norwegian natural gas to Poland via Denmark as a way of reducing Poland's reliance on Russian energy sources. Permits to resume the project were issued after the Danish environmental authorities withdrew their objections. Completion of the pipeline had originally been expected in autumn 2022, but now may be delayed by three some months as a result of the interruption.

Documentary on Polish zookeepers saving Jews shown at 700 US cinemas - A Polish documentary entitled "Of Animals and Men" has been shown at some 700 movie theaters across America. It tell the story of how fugitive Jews were sheltered by Jan and Antonina Zabiński during World War II when such assistance carried an automatic death sentence. On the grounds of the Warsaw Zoo, the Żabiński lived in a house which contained countless hiding places. Normally, the Jews had the run of the house but, whenever someone reported Germans approaching, Mrs. Żabiński would sit down at her piano and play a specific tune. That was a sign for everyone to take cover. That and many other episodes are vividly recalled by the documentary. "It's high time that the world can see the story through interviews with the survivors and members of the family of Jan and Antonina Zabiński," Pol-TV official Aleksandra Kaźmieruk remarked.

SUMMER SALADS

Green bean and tomato salad

1 pound of green beans, 4 tomatoes (preferably of different colors and varieties), 1 lemon, 2 tablespoons maple syrup, 10 tablespoons olive oil, ½ bunch fresh mint, salt and pepper

Wash beans thoroughly and trim the ends. Bring salted water to a boil, add beans and cook uncovered over high heat until beans are crisp-tender for about 5 minutes. Drain the water and pour cold water over the beans, drain. Cut tomatoes into slices or eights, add to the bowl with the beans. Scald lemon with hot water, grate the zest, squeeze the juice. Mix 4 tablespoons of juice with maple syrup, lemon zest and olive oil, season with salt and pepper. Tear off the mint leaves from the twigs, add most of them to the beans and tomatoes, pour over the dressing and mix. Season with pepper and sprinkle with the rest of the mint leaves.

Cucumber and leek salad

3 large green cucumbers (approx. 2 lb.), 1 leek (approx. 5-6 oz), 2 cloves garlic, 2 tablespoons olive oil, juice squeezed from 1 lemon juice, salt and pepper to taste.

Wash the cucumbers, dry and dice them. Cut the white part of the leek into small slices. Peel and crush the garlic. Put the cucumber, leek and garlic into a bowl. Add olive oil, a few drops of lemon juice, salt and pepper to taste. Mix everything together thoroughly and refrigerate for about 30 minutes.

Higher Perspectives St. Anne, Mother of Mary,

Grandmother of the Messiah

The month of July is here and with it, the beautiful feast day of St. Anne is approaching on July 26th. For anyone who has a devotion to Our Lady, a love for St.

Anne should follow, as she is the mother of our Blessed Mother and the grandmother of the Messiah! In recent years, her husband, St. Joachim has also been added to this feast day celebration, as he is the father of Mary and the grandfather of the Messiah.

After the Second Vatican Council in the mid 1960's, devotions to the saints were on the decline. Yet in recent years, there seems to be a renewed interest in devotion to the saints and along with it, a deeper understanding in the role they play in assisting us on the road to salvation. Do you remember shortly after the year 2000, when the relics of St. Terese, the Little Flower, made their way throughout the United States? Great crowds came to venerate her relics and prayed that she would intercede on their behalf before the Throne of God. I think this speaks volumes of this renewed interest in the saints and their role they play in our lives. St. Anne is one of the great saints of the Church and someone we can place our trust in.

Some would say that there is no need to pray to the saints and that we should pray only to God. Of course, we should pray to God directly as He is the Loving Father who gave us His Son as our Redeemer and our prayers to Him are always heard and answered according to His will for us. However, it is also appropriate and encouraged by the Church for us to also ask the saints to come to our aid and present our intentions before God as well. I look at it in this light: if the saints live with God in Heaven, why not ask them, as they are so close to Him, to present our needs and plead our cause.

As far as actual historical records go, there is not much known about the parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary. A great deal of what we know is based on oral tradition. This tradition is rich and the devotion to Mary's parents is long standing. Images of St. Anne with the child Mary are found in a great number of churches throughout the world. Many churches and parishes are named in her honor and many of us have made the trip to the famous shrine that bears her name in Beaupre, Canada. History tells us that the first church in St. Anne's honor was dedicated in 550 AD in Jerusalem, near the site where the family resided. St. Anne is considered the patron saint of mothers and women in labor.

Growing up at Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Polish Parish, the feast day of St. Anne was celebrated with a solemn novena to St. Anne, which begins the day after the Feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. This novena was prayed in both the Polish and English languages and concluded with a Mass of Thanksgiving on her feast day, July 26th. After Mass, veneration of the relic of St. Anne took place followed by a special "Polish" breakfast in the Social Hall. This day has long been a highlight of the year for us at Our Lady of Mount Carmel, as it rounds out our devotion to Mary, the Glorious Queen of Carmel, paying tribute to her mother and the grandmother of Our Lord.

In our Polish tradition, the Feast of St. Anne has a reminder that summer is flying by and fall, and winter are just around the corner. This saying goes, "From St. Anne's Day, the evenings and mornings are cool".

As I finish these thoughts on St. Anne, I leave you with this beautiful prayer, to her, the mother of Mary and the grandmother of the Messiah:

Good St. Anne, mother of her who is our life, our sweetness and

our hope, pray to her for us and obtain my request (three times) Saint Anne, pray for us!

Zaplanuj Medicare

Każdego dnia blisko 12 000 osób zbliża się do wieku, w którym przysługuje Medicare. Badania rynku pokazują, że aż 67% emerytów chciałoby lepiej zrozumieć zasady jego działania. W dzisiejszym artykule poruszę 6 kluczowych kwestii, o których powinna wiedzieć każda osoba wchodząca lub będąca na Medicare

1. Medicare składa się z różnych cześci

Jednym z mylących aspektów Medicare jest fakt, że składa się on z kilku odrębnych części. Każda z nich wiąże się z różnymi zasadami i kosztami. W wielkim skrócie:

- Część A obejmuje wizyty w szpitalu i wykwalifikowaną opiekę pielęgniarską;
- Część B obejmuje opiekę zapobiegawczą, wizyty lekarskie i diagnostykę;
- Część D jest planem zniżkowym na leki na receptę.

Istnieje również coś takiego jak cześć C, zwana inaczej Medicare Advantage.

2. Medicare nie jest darmowe

Wiele osób uważa, że posiadanie Medicare nic nie kosztuje. Niestety nie jest to prawda. Chociaż część A jest bezpłatna dla przeważającej większości zarejestrowanych, części B i D, a także niektóre plany związane z częścią C zazwyczaj pobierają składki.

3. Medicare nie obejmuje wszyst-

O ile niektóre plany typu Medicare Advantage mogą pokryć koszty części usług dentystycznych, usług związanych z badaniem lub leczeniem wzroku oraz słuchu, o tyle oryginalny Medicare oferuje bardzo ograniczony zakres pokrycia kosztów w powyższych kategoriach. Na przykład opłata za pracę dentystyczną jest generalnie dokonywana tylko wtedy, gdy wiąże się one z innym leczonym schorzeniem pokrywanym przez Medicare lub jeśli przed operacją objętą ubezpieczeniem konieczny jest egzamin stomatologiczny.

I chociaż oryginalny Medicare zapłaci za badanie i leczenie niektórych chorób oczu, takich jak jaskra, nie pokryje on kosztów badań wzroku ani okularów na receptę.

Naucz się Medicare

Koszty związane z Medicare będą musiały zostać uwzględnione w Twoim budżecie emerytalnym, więc opłaca się o nich wiedzieć na długo przed opuszczeniem na stałe miejsca pracy i przejściem na emeryturę. W ten sposób będziesz lepiej przygotowany do oceny Twoich oszczędności i dokonywania wyborów finansowych, które nie pozostawiają Cię bez środków pieniężnych w latach późniejszych.

Pamiętaj, że opieka zdrowotna jest jednym z największych wydatków, z jakimi borykają się emeryci, a zrozumienie Medicare pomoże Ci uniknąć podstawowych błędów.

- 1 lipca 1569 r. podpisana została Unia lubelska - porozumienie pomiędzy stanami Korony Królestwa Polskiego i Wielkiego Księstwa Litewskiego zawarte na sejmie walnym w Lublinie. W jej wyniku powstała Rzeczpospolita Obojga Na-
- 1 lipca 1991 r. w Pradze rozwiązano Układ Warszawski (wojskowo-militarny sojusz państw blo-

ku wschodniego z dominującą rolą ZSRR). 25 lutego 1991 r. w Budapeszcie podpisano umowę o zaprzestaniu współpracy wojskowej w ramach Układu, 1 lipca 1991 roku w Pradze rozwiązano struktury polityczne.

9 lipca 1521 r. – na Wieży Zygmuntowskiej katedry wawelskiej w Krakowie zawieszono dzwon, wykonany w krakowskiej ludwisarni przez ludwisarza Hansa Behama z Norymbergi w 1520 roku. Ufundowany przez Zygmunta I Starego dzwon, nazwany został jego imieniem.

15 lipca 1410 r. - rozegrała się bitwa pod Grunwaldem, jedna z największych bitew w historii średniowiecznej Europy (pod względem liczby uczestników), stoczona między siłami zakonu krzyżackiego, wspomaganego przez rycerstwo zachodnioeuropejskie, pod dowództwem wielkiego mistrza Ulricha von Jungingena, a połączonymi siłami polskimi i litewskimi, pod dowództwem króla Polski Władysława II Jagiełły i wielkiego księcia litewskiego Witolda. Bitwa zakończyła się zwycięstwem wojsk polsko-litewskich i pogromem sił krzyżackich.

22 lipca 1944 r. - ogłoszony został Manifest Polskiego Komitetu Wyzwolenia Narodowego, uznawany za początek istnienia PRL-u. Został podpisany przez Stalina w Moskwie dwa dni wcześniej.

28 lipca 1656 r. - rozpoczęła się bitwa ze Szwedami pod Warszawą, pod względem liczby kombatantów, była to największa bitwa w dziejach wojen polsko-szwedzkich rozegrana w czasie tzw. Potopu szwedzkiego. Bitwę wygrali Szwedzi i Brandenburczycy.

WIWAT MAJ, 3-CI MAJ CZYLI KONSTYTUCYJNE DELIBERACJE ZESPOŁU "POLONIA"

Na zaproszenie dyrektor Szkoły Polskiej św. Ferdynanda w Chicago Haliny Żurawskiej w dniu 1 maja 2021 w kaplicy parafialnej odbyło się widowisko historyczne w reżyserii autorki Iwony Puc pt. "Deklaracja 3 Maja 1791". Inspiracją powstania widowiska był słynny, wszystkim Polakom znany obraz Jana Matejki "Konstytucja 3 Maja" namalowany w stuletnią rocznicę tego ważnego wydarzenia.

Widowisko zaprezentowane zostało przez Zespoł Pieśni i Tańca "Polonia", którego tancerze oraz aktorzy przyodziani w stylowe szaty z epoki, w ujmujący sposób przenieśli zgromadzonych widzów do czasów wieku XVIII, kiedy to 3 maja 1791 r. w Warszawie radosny tłum wiwatował na cześć uchwalenia długo ocze-



kiwanej, nowej konstytucji, dzięki której wszystkie stany społeczne państwa polskiego pokładały nadzieję na lepszy byt kraju i sprawiedliwe dla wszystkich rządy. 3 maja 1791 roku to ważna data i znaczący moment w polskiej historii pokazujący akt uchwalenia Konstytucji, jako początek procesu, który doprowadził do całkowitej likwidacji państwa polskiego. Jest to dla Polaków szczególna rocznica, świętowana jako pamięć powstania dokumentu, który tak naprawdę nigdy nie obowiązywał oraz został uchwalony z naruszeniem ówczesnego prawa.

Zaprezentowane widowisko taneczno-teatralne to wzruszająca, ponadczasowa inscenizacja, zwłaszcza dla emigrantów, która tworzy patriotyczny klimat i wyzwola emocje i doświadczenia tęsknoty za krajem oraz silne poczucie równości i braterstwa, gdyż odwaga Polaków ma swe korzenie w Konstytucji 3 Maja, zapoczątkowywując nową erę w historii. Już pierwsza scena ukazuje widzom znane historycznie znakomitości tamtych czasów, kiedy na rękach wniesiono marszałka sejmu Stanisława Małachowskiego trzymającego w dłoni nową ustawę, która przy boku triumfalnie kroczącego króla Polski Stanisława Augusta Poniatowskiego została odczytana jako pierwsza demokratyczna polska konstytucja, pierwsza w Europie oraz druga na świecie. Nie zabrakło też postaci kapłana Hugona Kołłątaja, twórcy konstytucji oraz Róży Dekert wręczajacej królowi wieniec lau-





rowy, jako symbol zwycięstwa i triumfu demokracji przy rozlegających się radośnie okrzykach: "Wiwat król, wiwat naród, wiwat wszystkie stany"! Poprzez poetyczno-satyryczne wersy przewijały się takty dworskiej muzyki i taneczne układy eleganckiego menueta, wytwornego poloneza i skocznego mazura.

Widowisko swoją obecnością zaszczycił konsul RP Piotr Semeniuk, który na koniec powiedział kilka ciepłych słów do tancerzy i zgromadzonych, dziękując dyrektor szkoły za gościnę. Konstytucyjne przedstawienie było transmitowane w internecie za pomocą "live streaming" oraz stało sie cześcią wirtualnej parady trzeciociomajowej organizowanej przez Związek Klubów Polskich w Chicago.

Istniejący już od 30 lat Zespoł Pieśni i Tańca "Polonia", działający pod patronatem Zjednoczenia Polskiego Rzymsko-Katolickiego w Ameryce to miejsce, gdzie młodzi tancerze poznają świat i piękną polską sztukę ludową, obrzędy i obyczaje, kultywując wiele polskich tradycji religijnych i patriotycznych. Zespół oferuje szeroki repertuar obejmujący różnorodność tańców narodowych i ludowych, współczesnych i historycznych, jak również formy widowisk teatralnych. "Polonia" już ponad 20-krotnie reprezentowała swój program na światowych festiwalach na wszystkich kontynentach naszego globu. Zespół gromadzi tancerzy w wielu grupach wiekowych od 3 do 30 lat tańcząc, śpiewając i z dumą celebrując patriotyzm oraz bogactwo dziedzictwa polskiej kultury. Zapraszamy do odwiedzenia strony internetowej oraz Facebook, gdzie można znaleźć informacje o kolejnych występach, o historii zespołu oraz wiele pamiątkowych zdjęć z okolicznych imprez, widowisk i wojaży podboju świata.





OBCHODY ROCZNICY 30-LECIA POWSTANIA GRUPY WYSZECHRADZKIEJ



Konsulowie i przedstawiciele dyplomatyczni i handlowi

Konsulat Generalny RP w Chicago był gospodarzem obchodów jubileuszu 30-lecia powstania Grupy Wyszehradzkiej – V4 oraz rocznicy polskiej prezydencji w Grupie Wyszehradzkiej. Wydarzenie odbyło się w czwartek 6 czerwca, udział wzięli w nim udział przedstawiciele korpusu dyplomatycznego, przedstawiciele Illinois Department of Commerce & Economic Opportunity, World Business Chicago (WBC), Chicago Sister Cities Inter-(CSCI), national Chicagoland Chamber of Commerce (CCC), SelectChicago, Polsko-Amerykańskiej Izby Handlowej (PACC), Polskich Linii Lotniczych LOT, PGS Software oraz liderzy diaspor polskiej, węgierskiej, czeskiej i słowackiej w Stanach Zjednoczonych.

Program poprowadziła p.o. konsula generalnego RP w Chicago Małgorzata Bąk-Guzik. Przemówienia wygłosili: Tamas Kovacs, konsul generalny Węgier w Chicago; Jaroslav Kantůrek, konsul generalny Republiki Czeskiej w Chicago; Rosemary Macko Wisnosky, konsul honorowy Republiki Słowackiej w Chicago oraz Michał J. Rzeźnik, szef Zagranicznego Biura Handlowego w Chicago, Polskiej Agencji Inwestycji i Handlu (PAIH) i współorganizator uroczystości.

Konsul Bak-Guzik serdecznie powitała również obecnych na uroczystości przedstawicieli dyplomatycznych i handlowych: konsula generalnego Bułgarii w Chicago Svetoslava Stankova; konsula generalnego Ukrainy w Chicago Serhiy

Koledova; zastępcę konsula generalnego Rumunii w Chicago Roberta Dumitrescu; komisarza ds. Handlu Konsulatu Generalnego Republiki Czeskiej w Chicago Tomáša Trnka; oraz komisarza ds. Handlu z Konsulatu Generalnego Węgier w Chicago Andrasa Juhasza.

Na zakończenie części oficjalnej wniesiony został jubileuszowy tort oraz wzniesiono toast szampanem.

Program artystyczny zaprezentował kwartet smyczkowy "Capriciosso", w skład którego wchodzą profesjonalni muzycy urodzeni w Polsce, Rumunii i Mołdawii: Anna Bivol (skrzypce), Fabian Ularu (skrzypce), Constantin Postolach (altówka) i Patrycja Likos (wiolonczela). W programie recitalu znalazły się utwory Dworaka, Montiego, Machajdika, Chopina, Smetany, Bartoka i Brahmsa. Wystąpiła również polska wokalistka jazzowa Grażyna Auguścik.

Grupa Wyszehradzka (V4) jest nieformalną regionalną forma współpracy czterech państw Środkowej Europy - Polski, Czech, Słowacji i Węgier, które łączy nie tylko sąsiedztwo i podobne uwarunkowania geopolityczne, ale przede wszystkim wspólna historia, tradycja, kultura oraz wartości.

Idea utworzenia Grupy była intensyfikacja współpracy w zakresie budowy demokratycznych struktur państwowych oraz wolnorynkowej gospodarki, a w dalszej perspektywie uczestnictwo w procesie integracji europejskiej. Za datę jej powstania przyjmuje się 15 lutego 1991 r., kiedy to prezydenci Polski Lech Wałęsa i Czechosłowacji Václav Havel oraz premier Węgier József Antall podpisali w węgierskim

wspólną mieście Wyszehrad deklarację określającą cele i warunki wzajemnej współpracy.

Od 2004 r. wszystkie kraje V4 są członkami Unii Europejskiej, a Grupa Wyszehradzka stanowi forum wymiany doświadczeń oraz wypracowywania wspólnych stanowisk w sprawach istotnych dla przyszłości regionu i Unii Europejskiej.

Poza kwestiami europejskimi, współpraca w ramach V4 koncentruje się przede wszystkim na sprawach dot. Europy Środkowej, wymianie informacji, a także kooperacji w zakresie kultury, nauki, edukacji oraz wymiany młodzieży. Priorytetowymi obszarami współpracy są rozbudowa infrastruktury transportowej oraz umacnianie bezpieczeństwa energetycznego w regionie. Istnieje również mechanizm współpracy z krajami trzecimi w formule "V4+".

We współpracę wyszehradzką zaangażowane są liczne i zróżnicowane podmioty: prezydenci, premierzy, ministrowie, parlamenty, instytucje rządowe, organizacje pozarządowe, ośrodki naukowe, uczelnie czy instytucje kultury.

Jedyną w pełni zinstytucjonalizowaną formą współpracy w V4 jest Międzynarodowy Fundusz Wyszehradzki z siedzibą w Bratysławie (IVF).

Przewodnictwo w Grupie pełnione jest na zasadzie rotacji i trwa rok, a jego program przyjmowany jest przez premierów państw wyszehradzkich. Od 1 lipca 2020 r. do 30 czerwca 2021 r. prezydencję w Grupie sprawuje Polska. (Grupa Wyszehradzka - Portal Gov.pl)
