NARÓD POLSKI 25 YEARS OLD!

January 1, 2022 marked the 125th anniversary of the printing of the first issue of the Naród Polski.

In 1873, Pielgrzym, or The Pilgrim (published first in Missouri and then in Detroit), announced Fr. Gieryk's invitation to all Polish lay and clerical leaders to attend a conference on October 3, 1873 in St. Adalbert's Church in Chicago. The conference led to the establishment of the PRCUA.

In the early years, PRCUA used privately-owned publications such as Pielgrzym (The Pilgrim), Gazeta Polska Katolicka (Polish Catholic Gazette) and Wiara i Ojczyzna (Faith and Fatherland), as its "official" organ to publish information concerning important Union matters.

In 1874, Jan Barzyński, editor of Pielgrzym, moved the publication from Detroit to Chicago, and its name was changed to Gazeta Polska Katolicka, which was published until 1888. Barzyński was the editor of Pielgrzym and then Gazeta Polska Katolicka until 1880. He was succeeded by Władysław Smulski as editor.

In 1888, the PRCUA designated the Resurrectionist Fathers' weekly newspaper Wiara i Ojczyzna as its offical organ. It was published until the end of 1896; Fr. Wincenty Barzyński and Fr. Gordon were the administrators of the publication.

Wiara i Ojczyzna had several editors. Rev. John Radziejewski, and Rev. Wiktor Zaleski were the managers of the publication. From 1888 to 1896, they worked with several editors: Stanisław Slisz, Tomasz Lobarzewski (1888), Rev. Felix Kachnowski (1889), Stanisław Szwajkart (1890), Ignacy Machnikowski (1891), and later Rev. Constance Domagalski, who coedited with Machnikowski, Szwajkart, and Szczęsny Zahajkiewicz. Szwajkart was the editor until the demise of Wiara i Ojczyzna in January of 1898.

At the 1896 PRCUA National Convention in Philadelphia, a resolution was adopted to purchase a printshop in Chicago and publish its own PRCUA organ. Originally, the new publication was to be titled Zjednoczenie (the Union) but changed to Naród (Nation). The first issue was printed on January 1, 1897. The name of the second issue was changed to Naród Polski (Polish Nation) because a Czech daily newspaper by that name was already being published in Chicago.


Tomasz Skaryszewski was the first editor of Naród Polski and was succeeded by Witold Zembaczyński. They were followed by Lucyan Horbaczynski (1897), Szczęsny Zahajkiewicz (1898-99), Ignacy Kowalski (1899-1903), Leon Szopiński (6 months).

In 1903, Karol Wachtel was elected editor and held the position until 1906 (he was also the author of the first PRCUA history Dzieje Zjednoczenia P.R.K. w Ameryce, published in 1913.) He returned as editor for one year from 1911 to 1912.

In 1906, Ignacy Kowalski was elected editor once again and held the position until 1911, when he was discharged.

In May of 1912, Franciszek Barć was appointed as editor of (continued on pg. 20)



The Ohio Fraternal Alliance annually awards a college scholarship up to \$500 to a graduating high school senior.








LEADERS OF THE POLISH ROMAN CATHOLIC UNION OF AMERICA **VICTOR (WIKTOR) BARDONSKI**

Victor Bardonski was born on December 23, 1853, in Wiele near Bydgoszcz, Poland (at the time, a territory reannexed by Prussia in 1815 as part of the Grand Duchy of Posen). He was a son of Jan Bardonski and Agnieszka Mroz.

He came to U.S. in 1871 with his parents and settled in Chicago. He worked in a tannery and attended school in the evenings to learn English and local customs.

He married Josephine Bloch on January 24, 1875, in Chicago. The wedding was officiated by Rev. Vincent Barzynski, C.R. (one of the founders and chaplain of the PRCUA). The Bardonskis had eight children, 2 sons: John Bartholomew and Bronisław and 6 daughters: Anna Martha, Mary Magdelena, Helena, Leocadia, Mathilda Josephine and Irene Victoria.

In 1883, Victor started working as a clerk at Schoenker drug store and was studying in the evenings.

He was elected PRCUA President at the 12th PRCUA Convention, held on September 29-30, 1885 in Grand Rapids, MI. He served for one year until the next convention in December 1886.

In 1886, Bardonski graduated as a pharmacist from the Chicago College of Pharmacy and opened his own drug store, The V. Bardonski Pharmacy, at 1256 Noble Street in Chicago. He later handed the store over to his son John. The Bardonski family owned their pharmacy until 1949.

At the 20th PRCUA Convention held in August 1893 in Chicago, Bardonski was elected as the treasurer of the newly formed Komitet Centralny Udziału Polonii Amerykańskiej na Wystawie Kościuszkowskiej we Lwowie (Committee of the Polish American Participation at the Kościuszko Exhibition in Lviv) to be held the following year on the occasion of the 100th anniversary of Kościuszko Uprising.

In May of 1894, Bardonski was elected as a vice chairman of the newly established Liga Polska (Polish

League), resigned his from position day the after the election.

Victor Bardonski was the first Pole



elected to the office of the Inspector of Pharmacies. He also was a member of the pharmacists' labor union (C.R.D.A.). The Union of Polish Doctors was established at his pharmacy, and three of his children were pharmacists.

In 1904, Victor's wife Josephine died. The same year, he was appointed the treasurer of the newly formed Society of Polish Pharmacists in Chicago.

In 1914, Bardonski married Maria (aka Maryanna) Owocki (née Baranowski) at St. Casimir Church in Milwaukee, WI. The ceremony was officiated by Rev. Bronisław Celichowski, the pastor of Ss. Cyril and Methodius Church in Milwaukee, who was later a PRCUA chaplain.

In 1918, Victor Bardonski became a member of the Committee of Doctors, Dentists and Pharmacists of the Polish Organization in Chicago and Cook County, which was in charge of organizing the 3rd Freedom Loan Campaign (Trzecia Kampania Pożyczki Wolnościowej).

According to the Theater Historical Society of America, Victor Bardonski was the operator of the Chopin Theatre in Chicago, which opened in March of 1918 and was originally built as a nickelodeon.

Bardonski was a parishioner of St. Stanislaus Kostka Church in Chicago, where he was active in various parish clubs and served as parish treasurer. He was also a member of the Polish National Alliance, the Catholic Order of Foresters, and St. Stanislaus Court.

Victor Bardonski passed away on 26 April 26, 1928 after a short illness. The funeral service was held at St. Stanislaus Kostka Church in Chicago. The funeral mass was celebrated by four priests (Rev. Stanislaus Siatka, C.R., Rev. Jozef Jelinek, C.R., Rev. Bronisław Lazarowicz, C.R., and Rev. Tadeusz Ligman C.R.). Bardonski was buried at St. Adalbert Cemetery in Niles, IL. PRCUA board members attended the funeral.

They are equipped with the latest computer, audiovisual and lab facilities, and most programs are offered in both Polish and English, so not knowing Polish is no obstacle to admission.

"OK, so an American gets a degree from a Polish university, but where does he go from there?" is an obvious concern. For one, Polish medical schools are accredited in the U.S., and Polish edicators insist that Polish diplomas open up doors to the

best companies on both sides of the Atlantic. Also, while studying in Poland a student has access to the European Union's study programs and is able to do internships or training abroad in English.

Many cultural perks await a Polish American studying here. They have a chance to tour the country and visit its imposing cathedrals, palaces and quaint Old Town districts not to mention its breathtaking Tatra Mountains and Europe's last primeval forest. During Christmas, Easter and summer vacations, any point in Europe is easily accessible from centrally located Poland. Even on weekends, such nearby countries as Germany, Russia, Sweden Austria. Ukraine and the Czech Republic are just a couple hours away.

The question on most everyone's mind is: How much will it cost? The good news is that the above-mentioned study programs are very affordable compared to the tuition fees charged by American universities. A bachelor's degree will set the student back around \$7,900 for all four years combined, and a master's program is within the \$10,000 range. Whether you are potentially interested or just curious, it never hurts to ask. Find out more at: https://study.gov.pl

POLISH LENTEN RECIPES

CHESE PANCAKES (racuchy z serem): Process 1 lb farmer cheese to a powder. Stir in 2 eggs and gradually add 1-1/2 c flour, stirring the whole time. When mixture is smooth, stir in 2 c buttermilk, 2 T sugar, 1/2 t baking soda and 1/2 t baking powder. Beat well with whisk or mixer for at least 5 min. Spoon into hot oil and fry to a nice golden-brown on both sides. Drain well on paper towel. Dust with confectioner's sugar or serve with fruit syrup or preserves of choice.

APPLE PANCAKES (racuchy z jabłkami): Combine 1-1/2 c flour, 1 c milk,

1 large egg, 1 T oil, 1 t baking powder and 1/2 t salt and mix well until smooth and lump-free. Stir in 2 peeled, cored, coarsely grated apples. A pinch of cinnamon may be added to batter if desired. Fry in hot oil on both sides to a light goldenbrown, drain on paper towel and dust with confectioner's sugar.

NOODLES & CHEESE (kluski z serem): Cook 16 oz flat egg noodles in lightly salted water until tender. Drain well, dot with about 2 T butter or margarine and stir in 16 oz grated or crumbled farmer cheese. Heat, stirring constantly, until cheese just begins to melt. Salt & pepper to taste.





POLISH NEWS BYTES

Poland's foreign policy to go global - PAP - Jakub Kumoch, President Andrzej Duda's top foreign-policy ad-

viser, told Poland's PAP new agency that, as one of Europe's biggest countries, "the time has come for Poland to conduct a more global policy." He explained that in 2022, "the President was planning stepped-up activities both in Europe and on other continents. We plan a new opening in Sub-Saharan Africa and South America and intend to establish our presence in the Indo-Pacific region." But Kumoch stressed that Central-East Europe and projects such as the Three Seas Initiative would remain the centerpiece of Polish diplomacy.

Chagall artworks to go on exhibit at Warsaw's National Museum - Warsaw's National Museum has purchased a collection of 14 works by famous Russian-French artist Marc Chagall (1887-1985). Some were auctioned off by his family in Switzerland while others were acquired separately. Dating from his final

period (1960s and 70s), they are due to go on exhibit at the museum this spring. "We had to really fight for some of the works. It's one of the most exquisite purchases the museum has achieved in recent years," explained National Museum curator Anna Manicka."

Polish oil giant clinches green nuclear deal - PKN Orlen, Poland's largest oil refinery, has set up a joint venture with the environmentallyminded energy firm Synthos Green Energy. "The project's main purpose is to prepare and commercialize small nuclear-reactor technology in Poland," the company said in a statement. Its main focus is on GE Hitachi Nuclear Energy's BWRX-300 reactors. The statement added that the project would "offer an opportunity to accelerate the decarbonization (phasing out coal) of the Orlen group's production assets, while also helping to improve energy security and drive economic growth," Orlen CEO Daniel Obajtek explained. He said he hoped the first reactor would be deployed in Poland by 2030.














National Dark Chocolate Day (2/1) – this is one of my favorite healthy treats, loaded with antioxidants which relieves brain fog. National Homemade Soup Day (2/4 not to be confused with National Soup Month, which is January). By the way, what is your favorite soup? National Clean Out Your Computer Day (2/14) - it's something to do

while eating chocolates from your valentine. Tell A Fairy Tale Day (2/26) - who comes up with this stuff? By the way, my favorite is Cinderella she worked hard in spite of her circumstances. Here's my last one, National Public Sleeping Day (2/28) perfect time to take the nap you planned. As my granddaughter Ariana says, "Are you kidding me?" Hope you had a laugh or two, because that was my objective.

Now from humor to history... the Sejm (lower house of the bicameral parliament) of Poland announced that 2022 will be the year of Maria Konopnicka, Maria Grzegorzewska, Wanda Rutkiewicz, Ignacy Łukasiewicz, Józef Mackiewicz and Józef Wybicki. I encourage each and every one of you to enhance your knowledge of these individuals, but in the meantime, allow me to provide you a short introduction.

Maria Konopnicka (1842-1910) is one of the greatest writers of Polish literature. Among her many works, her patriotic poem "Rota," published in 1908, was an anti-Germanization protest, which played a significant role in the history of the Polish people during a time when Poland was partitioned by its three neigh-

The Polish educator Maria Grzegorzewska (1888-1967) brought the special education movement to Poland. By proving that training children whose mental and physical health was compromised, she introduced "a shift in the evolution of educational thought from treating the disability to recognizing the needs of the person." (Wikipedia)

Wanda Rutkiewicz (1943-1992) was a Polish mountain climber and computer engineer. She was the first woman to reach the summit of K2 (the second highest mountain on earth) and the third woman (first European) to climb Mount Everest. In 1992, an unfortunate accident on the third highest mountain in the world, Kangchenjunga, led to her demise.

Ignacy Łukasiewicz (1822-1882) was a Polish pharmacist, engineer, businessman, inventor, and philanthropist. He was a pioneer who built the world's first modern oil refinery in 1856. His achievements included the discovery of how to distill kerosene from seep oil, the invention of the modern kerosene lamp (1853), the introduction of the first modern street lamp in Europe (1853), and the construction of the world's first modern oil well (1854). (Wikipedia)

Self-proclaimed "anticommunist by nationality," Józef Mackiewicz (1902-1985) was a Polish writer, novelist and political commentator. In 1943, he was invited by the International Katyń Commission to the site of the Katyń massacre and, with the consent of the Polish government-in-exile, "he assisted in the first excavations of the mass graves of Polish officers killed by Soviet NKVD there in 1940." Of his documentary novels, he is best known for "Nie trzeba głośno mówić" (One Is Not Supposed to Speak Aloud) and "Droga donikąd" (The Road to Nowhere). (Wikipedia)

Józef Wybicki (1747-1822) was a Polish nobleman, jurist, poet, political and military activist. He was a member of the Sejm many times, one of the initiators of the Confederation of Bar, a participant in the work implementing the Constitution of May 3, and a coorganizer of the Kościuszko Uprising. Wybicki was the author of "Mazurek Dabrowskiego" (Dąbrowski's Mazurka), also known as "Pieśń Legionów Polskich we Włoszech" (Song of the Polish Legions in Italy), which in 1927 was adopted as the Polish national anthem. In the coming year, we will also celebrate the 225th anniversary of the creation of the Dabrowski's Mazurka.

It was my hope that this month's article would include my reflections of various social events planned for January 2022 that were a pre-pandemic mainstay. Most were cancelled or postponed due to the current variant. One cancellation that I felt personally was the Winter Dinner Dance, the 45th anniversary celebration of the Wesoły Lud Polish Folk Dance Company. A joint concert with Southwest Center of Polish Song and Dance is still in the works, currently scheduled for Sunday, May 1, 2022. (SWCPSD was forced to

85TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE OPENING OF THE POLISH MUSEUM OF AMERICA

Since 1891, a Polish Library and a National Museum functioned in North America, in Chicago, founded by Henryk Kallusowski. They were moved to the Polish National Alliance College in Cambridge Springs, PA, in 1912. Unfortunately, a fire broke out in 1931 which completely destroyed the contents, and Polonia was deprived of a place attesting to its presence. From that time on, voices were raised intermittently calling for the creation of a Polish Museum in the United States, in the country where the greatest concentration of Poles outside the Fatherland existed.

The first motion on this subject was introduced in 1928 at the 39th Convention of the Polish Roman Catholic Union of America by Council 11 of Brooklyn, New York, which proposed that a Polish museum be established in the U.S. for the purpose of "collecting documents of Poland and Polonia for study by our future generations." In 1931, Council 69 of Chicago presented a similar project at the 40th PRCUA Convention held in Detroit, Michigan, which emphasized that "Polonia ... although numerous and affluent, does not have a single institution, not one place, where documents and evidence of our labors for this country and Poland could be deposited." In 1934, discussions were held about establishing a kind of historical society charged with the task of arranging in proper order the documents of *Wydział Narodowy Polski* (Polish National Committee), found in the PRCUA building.

A decisive opportunity presented itself in 1935, when the newly-elected President of the PRCUA, Joseph L. Kania, during a stay in Poland, apprised himself of the functions of its many museums. Upon his return, he proceeded to plan an archive and museum with great enthusiasm, and on October 15, 1935, persuaded the PRCUA Board of Directors to adopt the following recommendation: "Having concluded after extensive study that it is the museums and archives that most accurately reflect national culture and historic events, and that they not only record the high degree of a nation's learning but serve also as a center and workshop for academic and scientific research, contributing to the growth of enlightenment, and that there, in Polonia, they will evoke the respect of others for Poles in America, I propose the establishment of a permanent Museum and Archives of Polonia at the Polish Roman Catholic Union."

President Kania then introduced Miecislaus Haiman as the curator, archivist, and librarian. Press releases soon appeared with appeals for historical mementos: "Old books and newspapers, all manner of periodicals published in America, especially jubilee books of parishes and societies, pro-

clamations, photographs, letters, convention badges and buttons of various celebrations, medals, old coins - all of this is welcomed at the Archives and Museum," wrote Haiman in *Naród Polski*. In response, an enormous amount of gifts began to arrive from all parts of the country.

Very soon, the space allotted for the Museum proved insufficient. A Museum Committee, formed in January 1936, decided on the reconstruction of three offices on the second floor of the PRCUA building, those of the Real Estate Department and the Medical Office. The work was completed at the end of 1936, and the official grand opening of the Museum took place on January 12, 1937 in the PRCUA Auditorium. The celebration was attended by representatives of the Polish Government, Chicago authorities, the clergy, organizations of Polonia, and the press. Among the speakers were Dr. Waclaw Gawronski, the Polish Consul General; Edward J. Kelly, Mayor of Chicago; and distinguished Polonian activist, Dr. Bronislaw Smykowski of Bridgeport, Connecticut. In his inaugural speech, President Kania declared: "In the Archives and Museum, which we have created in PRCUA Headquarters, we wish to gather, not for ourselves and not for our organization, but for the entire American Polonia, all of the priceless memorabilia, which will be handed down to new generations. We dedicate the Polish Museum at PRCUA to the Polonia of America. May it always serve with propriety and beneficially, to the glory of Polonia."

In 1959, The Museum and Archives of the Polish Roman Catholic Union of America was incorporated as the Polish Museum of America (The PMA).

(The Polish Museum of America: History and Collections - Guide)

The Polish Museum of America is one of the oldest and largest ethnic museums in the United States. It offers permanent and temporary exhibits, cultural events, lectures, concerts, author and artist meetings and workshops. The archives preserve historic documents, maps and photographs from various Polish and Polish-American organizations and individuals. The library holds over 100,000 books in Polish and English, available for research and lending, the Polonica Collection, rare books and periodicals.

NARÓD POLSKI IS 125 YEARS OLD!

the *Naród Polski*. His appointment was reaffirmed at the next two Conventions and he remained editor until 1917.

In 1917, Zygmunt Stefanowicz became editor. He held this position until 1931, when Franciszek Barć returned to the office. Barć was editor until 1941.

Stefanowicz came back as editor in 1941 and held this position until

1974. He served as editor of the *Naród Polski* for a total of 47 years. In the 1940s, English texts were introduced on two pages of the newspaper.

In 1946, the PRCUA print shop was closed and sold so printing of the newspaper was moved to the Home Office.

In 1971, printing of the *Naród Polski* was commissioned to a private printing house in Detroit.

Stefanowicz was succeeded by Joseph Zurawski, who was elected as editor of *Naród Polski* at the Convention in 1974 and was the editor until

1986. Under his leadership, the newspaper's format was gradually changed from mostly Polish to two-thirds English (as recommended by Stefanowicz at the 1970 Convention.)

From 1986 to 1989, Andrew Azarjew was editor-in-chief of the newspaper. In 1989, he was appointed managing editor in charge of the Polish section. He held this post until 1993.

In 1989, Kathryn Rosypal was appointed as executive editor of the *Naród Polski*. She was the first woman editor and was given a task of intro-

ducing desktop publishing to the newspaper. She was executive editor of the *Naród Polski* for 25 years, until her retirement in 2014.

After Andrew Azarjew retired, Lidia Kowalewicz was appointed acting managing editor from 1993 to 1994, and was promoted to managing editor in 1994. In 2014, she was appointed editor.

Naród Polski was published weekly for 49 years. Starting in 1946, it was a semi-monthly publication for 63 years, until July of 2009, when it became a monthly publication.



At the end of last month, on January 22nd, we marked yet another year of legalized abortion in the United States. It is sad that in a country like ours that prides itself on life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, we have allowed this to happen for the last 49

years! Life has become disposable, an inconvenience for some, instead of the awesome gift that it truly is. We, as followers of Christ are called upon to defend and protect the sanctity of human life during all of its stages, especially where human life is most vulnerable, in the womb.

St John Paul II often reminded us of this fact and promoted a 'Gospel of Life' in the face of a culture of death in which we now live. His quote, "A society will be judged on the basis of how it treats its weakest members; and among the most vulnerable are surely the unborn and the dying" is a challenge for us to do everything we can to be defenders of the sanctity of human

Sometimes we will be ridiculed and maybe even suffer because of it but the Lord's call to discipleship requires that we be defenders of all human life.

In preparing this month's column about this great gift called life, I came across this beautiful prayer to St. Joseph, the Defender of Life. It is published by the United States Catholic Conference of Bishops and sums up what the Church teaches about the sanctity and defense of life. I hope that you will pray this prayer often and with conviction. May the right to life in the United States be safeguarded and guaranteed for all one day soon.

> Dearest St. Joseph, at the word of an angel, you lovingly took Mary into your home. As God's humble servant, you guided the Holy Family on the road to Bethlehem, welcomed Jesus as your own son in the shelter of a manger, and fled far from your homeland for the safety of both Mary and Child. We praise God that as their faithful protector, you never hesitated to sacrifice for those entrusted to you. May your example inspire us also to welcome, cherish, and safeguard God's most precious gift of life. Help us to faithfully commit ourselves to the service and defense of human life - especially where it is vulnerable or threatened. Obtain for us the grace to do the will of God in all things. St. Joseph, Defender of life. Pray for us!



- \$1,556 odpowiedzialności własnej (deductible) za pobyt w szpitalu do 60 dni;
- \$389 odpowiedzialności wspólnej (coinsurance) za każdy dzień pobytu w szpitalu w dniach 61-90;


