PRCUA MOURNS THE LOSS OF PAST VICE PRESIDENT DOLORES SPEJEWSKI

It is with great sadness that we share the news that Dolores Spejewski, 92 of Tucson, AZ (formerly of Munster, IN) passed away on Tuesday May 17, 2022.

Mrs. Spejewski (née Brainer) was born in East Chicago, IN, and together with her husband of 48 years, Joseph, who passed away in 1996, they were long time members

of St. John Cantius Parish in East Chicago and later members of St. Thomas More Parish in Munster, IN. For many years, she worked as a teachers aide at St. John Cantius Catholic Church Elementary Consolidated School.

Dolores Spejewski was a member of PRCUA for 67 years. In the past, she served as both treasuer and financial sercretary for PRCUA Queen Mary of Poland Society #413. She was also treasurer of District 9 and for eight years worked as National Director of District 9.

Mrs. Spejewski was elected as PRCUA Resident Vice President and served in the position from 1990 to 1998. She was delegated the responsiblity of directing the entire Fraternal Department, including the PRCUA dance and language schools as well as the Sports Department. The Fraternal Department also took over

the management of the PMA gift shop. Mrs. Spejewski continued to manage the gift shop on a volunteer basis after she retired from office.

She was a delegate to every PRCUA Convention from 1966 to 2014 and served on both the Credentials and Qualifications Committees.


During her time in office, Mrs. Spejewski wrote a regular column in

the Naród Polski titled Fraternal Highlights, in which she briefly identified the most important PRCUA events and member news. She assisted President Dykla in welcoming distinguished visitors at the Home Office and in representing PRCUA and Polonia at the events held locally, throughout the United States and overseas. She attended Cinderella and Prince Charming Balls, Michigan State Ball, Illinois-Indiana Women's Department events, annual Sacred Heart Masses, Opłateks and Święconkas, sport tournaments, school graduations and recitals, anniversaries of various societies and other celebrations.

In 1998, Dolores Spejewski ran for the office of PRCUA president.

Mrs. Spejewski will be remembered for her kindness, essence of duty, energy and sense of humor. She was a member (continued on pg. 12)

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE MAY 3RD POLISH CONSTITUTION CELEBRATIONS IN CHICAGO

After a two-year break caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, Polish Americans again celebrated Polish Diaspora Day, Polish Flag Day, and the 231st anniversary of the Polish Constitution of 1791, previously observed in Chicago.

The PRCUA Executive Officers and National Directors had a very busy week representing the Union at many events organized on the ocassion of the above observances.

On May 2, PRCUA James Robaczewski, Vice President Micheline Jaminski, Secretary-Treasurer Agnieszka Bastrzyk, and District #7 Director Joanna Cholewinski attended the ceremonial raising of the Polish flag at Daley Plaza. The celebration was organized by the Alliance of Polish Clubs in the USA (Związek Klubów Polskich w USA) and the Consulate General of the Republic of Poland in Chicago. Alan Krashesky (news anchor and reporter at ABC 7 Chicago), who was named the 2022 Grand Marshal of the May 3rd Parade, raised the flag while Natalia Kawalec sang the Polish and American national anthems to the accompaniment of the 144th Army Band of the Illinois Army National Guard. The ceremony was attended by city, county and state dignitaries, representatives of the Consulate General of the Republic of Poland in Chicago and Polish Parliament, and delegates of the Ukrainian Consulate in Chicago and Ukrainian organizations.

On Monday evening, President Robaczewski, Vice President Jaminski, Directors Anna Krysinski and Joanna Cholewinski and Naród Polski Executive Editor Lidia Kowalewicz attended a recep-

The event began with remarks given by Consul Małgorzata Bąk-Guzik, followed by the presentation of awards to the winners of the Wybitny Polak za granicą (Outstanding Pole Abroad) competition. The program ended with musical performances by the Air National Guard Band of the Midwest and the Ukrainian vocal trio Trioda from Tarnopol. Immediately after the ceremony, the participants attended a breakfast gathering held prior to the start of the Constitution Day Parade. President James Robaczewski, Vice President Micheline Jaminski, PRCUA Adult Culture Group President Edward Muszalski, together with PRCUA's Cinderella Natalia Bafia and Prince Charming Marcel Duda, along with runners-up Weronika Kaczmarczyk and Jakub Niedzielski, attended the

After the recital, each of the dancers received certificates of recognition for completing their year with Gwiazda. 5-year awards were presented to Henry Gerdan, Kasia Jaworski, Parker Baranski, and Charlotte Kayl. 10-year awards were presented to Olivia Srodek and Nina

El-Alayli.

Thanks go to Gwiazda's director, choreographer, officers, costume director, and all of the parents, grandparents and families for all of their efforts in making the 2022 recital a great success.

On May 7, after a two year COVID hiatus, the Gwiazda Dancers returned to perform at the annual Strawberry Festival held at St. Florian Church in Hamtramck. Strawberry Festival feels like a home court advantage for the group because many Gwiazda parents attended school at St. Florian, or they and their families are parishioners at St. Florian. Gwiazda presented a half-hour program which featured Polish national and regional dances.

On the morning of May 14, several Gwiazda dancers and their families participated in the PRCUA Join Hands Day and assisted in cleaning up the grounds in and around St. Albertus church in Detroit. A recognized historical landmark in the State of Michigan, founded in 1871, St. Albertus was the first Polish American Parish in the Archdiocese of Detroit, and was instrumental in the founding of PRCUA. In the late 1960s, before he was pope, St. John Paul II visited St. Albertus and said Mass there.

In the evening of May 14, the Gwiazda Dancers, along with PRCUA groups the Halka Dancers, the Polskie Maki Dancers, and the Zajączek Dancers participated in the annual Polish Heritage Night with

Detroit City FC in Hamtramck. We were also thrilled to have PRCUA National Director Colleen Bonkowski and PRCUA Vice President emeritus Bob Bielenda in attendance at the event. The match, which pitted DCFC against Loudon FC, had Polish themed events throughout the evening. The event began with former Hamtramck Mayor Karen Majewski and current Hamtramck Councilperson Amanda Jaczkowski (a Zajączek alumna) receiving the game ball. At halftime during the match, the PRCUA dance schools were led on to the pitch by members of the Polish Scouting Organization (ZHP), the Polish national anthem was played and then the dancers performed the oberek and a polka in front of over 5,000 fans. IS IT SAFE TO VISIT POLAND IN 2022?

The COVID-19 pandemic has disrupted a great many things, not excluding the cultural life and social activities of our Polonia. Although tourism to Poland came to a standstill in 2020, already last year it began

rebounding. This year the number of PolAms visiting their ancestral homeland is expected to increase. But what about Russia's invasion of Poland's next-door neighbor Ukraine? Here are some things to consider:

MOST COVID RESTRICTIONS

LIFTED: The decline of new cases has prompted Poland's health authorities to withdraw most pandemic restrictions as of May 1st, 2022:

- Face masks need not be worn in public except for hospitals and other medical facilities.
- Proof of vaccination no longer needs to be presented when crossing the border into Poland.
- Quarantine, isolation or isolation at home as well as sub

- mission to mandatory quarantine after crossing the border into Poland are no longer required.
- A diagnostic test for COVID-19 when crossing the border into Poland from countries outside the European Union's Schengen area, including the U.S. and Canada, is no longer required.








LEADERS OF THE POLISH ROMAN CATHOLIC UNION OF AMERICA ANDRZEJ KAŹMIERCZAK

Andrzej Kaźmierczak was born on August 16, 1874 in Podolin in the Duchy of Poznań. His parents were Franciszek and Franciszka (nee Krygier) Kaźmierczak. He was baptized in Srebrna Góra.

In 1887, the Kaźmierczak family immigrated to the United States and settled in Buffalo, NY, where Andrzej's grandparents lived. In Buffalo, Andrzej graduated from elementary school and then attended public high school. Additionally, he was tutored by private teachers.

At a young age, he started working in a screw factory; in 1903, he worked in the daily newspaper "Pole in America"; in 1907, in the sheriff's office in Buffalo, then, for 12 years, in the Office of the Health Department of Buffalo, NY. For some time he was also the president of the weekly publication "Gwiazda" (The Star) which was published for the Polish community in Buffalo by the local political party.

In 1897, he joined the PRCUA Św. Jerzy Society #203, where he held the offices of president, vice president and treasurer for many years. For his dedication to the society, its members presented him with a gold chain for his pocket watch.

He organized three PRCUA societies in Buffalo and was a cofounder of a few other societies. Kaźmierczak was a co-founder of PRCUA Osada 1 (Circuit #1), of which he was a president for many years, and was influential in founding of PRCUA Osada #2 (Circuit #2).

He attended the PRCUA Convention in 1901 for the first time and was a delegate of every convention until 1954.

In 1904, he was appointed by the PRCUA administration as a delegate to the Third Polish Catholic Congress (III Kongres Polonii Katolickiej) convention, held in Pittsburgh, PA, and later participated in many other Conventions and meetings organized by Polish American organizations and clubs.

In 1907, he was elected the chair-



man of the PRCUA convention. Thanks to his efforts, during the second vote during this convention, the General Aid Department (Wydział Wsparć w Kalectwie) was founded and the new Circuits were created. Kaźmierczak was elected comptroller of the PRCUA books and finances and served in this capacity for two years. He was asked by the Buffalo Mayor to organize the Polish marching division. He was asked to be a guest speaker at various celebrations, rallies and political meetings.

At the 1909 convention, he was again elected as the convention chairman and the chairman of the General Aid Department, which was moved from Chicago to Buffalo. Kaźmierczak developed the department's rules and applications, and he was the chairman of the department for ten years.

At the 1911 convention, Kaźmierczak again served as the chairman of the convention. He tried to pass a resolution to establish gymnastics societies in the PRCUA to encourage youth to join the organization, and was in favor of appointing a PRCUA controllerer and stablishing a retirement home for Union members.

In 1915, as the president of Osada 1, he organized Polish Day together with other Polish organizations and clubs in Buffalo. The income from the event was sent to help the poor in Poland.

In 1916, he organized a commit-

tee consisting of representatives of all Polish societies and organizations in Buffalo to arrange a joint May 3rd Polish Constitution celebration and a 4-day bazaar with the intention of colleting the funds to be sent to the poor in Poland. The celebration attracted 20,000 participants; guest speakers included the New York State governor, Bishop of Buffalo Most Rev. Denis Dougherty, John Smulski from Chicago, and representatives from all Polish organizations.

In 1917, he organized a political club consisting of all the Polish organizations operating at that time in Buffalo and became its president (it ceased to exist a year later because of internal disagreements).

Tha same year, after the U.S. entered World War I, he was appointed by General Newton E. Turgeon in Buffalo as a captain to register men for the army.

In 1919, Kaźmierczak organized 18 PRCUA societies. At the national convention held the same year in Newark, NY, he was reelected as convention chairman and later as the PRCUA Vice President. He was also a member of a committee commissioned to develop the new insurance tables for the Union, which were approved at the 1923 convention in Philadelphia, PA.

In 1920, Kaźmierczak was nominated by the Democratic Party as a member of the Legislative Assembly in Buffalo.

Delegates of the 37th Convention in 1922, held in Pittsburgh, PA, elected Kaźmierczak as PRCUA President. He was reelected in 1924 and held this position until 1928.

In 1922, Kaźmierczak assisted by PRCUA Vice President and Treasurer at the 10th anniversary celebration of the PNA College in Cambridge Springs, PA.

In 1923, an attempt was made to organize the Congress of Polish Organizations (Kongres Polskich Organiazacji), which was to replace the National Department (Wydział Narodowy). Kaźmierczak was one of the initiators of establishing this new body. On April 5, 1923, a meeting of the presidents of all Polish diaspora organizations was held in the PRCUA building to establish the new organization, but the attempt was unsuccessful and the National Department was retained. Kaźmierczak was the Treasurer of the National Department.

In the early 1920s, the PRCUA hosted many eminent Polish politicians and activists such as: General Józef Haller, Edward Loth (who organized help for academic youth in Poland), member of the Polish Parliament Dr. Władysław Wróblewski, president of the National Department Józef Sawicki, Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Poland Aleksander Skrzyński (who was presented with a check for \$2,000 as a PRCUA gift for flood victims in Poland).

On January 28, 1924, during his visit to the PRCUA Home Office, Ignacy Jan Paderewski decorated President Kaźmierczak, Chaplain Rev. Celichowski, Rev. Gronkowski and Rev. Feldheim with the Polonia Restituta Crosses, for their service to the Polish cause.

From November 25 to November 27, 1923, PRCUA celebrated its Golden Jubilee with a jubilee Mass at St. Stanislaus Kostka Church in Chicago, a Mass in the intention of all the deceased PRCUA members at St. Adalbert Church, a ball held in the PRCUA grand hall, and a jubilee banquet at Auditorium Hotel. Kaźmierczak was one of the keynote speakers at the banquet.


On February 6, 1924, Kaźmierczak and other Polish-American representatives attended the funeral mass of U.S. President Woodrow Wilson, in Washington, D.C.

On November 10, 1925, a PRCUA delegation consisting of President Kaźmierczak, Chaplain Celichowski, Vice President Żolińska, Treasurer Rostenkowski and Editor Stefanowicz welcomed Archbishop Jan Cieplak who came to New York. On November 1, Archbishop Cieplak was received at the PRCUA Home Office, and later the same day at banquet in the PRCUA Grand Hall. Archbishop Cieplak passed away during his visit to Passaic, NJ on February 17, 1926. A PRCUA delegation, led by Kaźmierczak attended the funeral on New York.

On February 12-13, 1927, representatives of the major Polish-American organizations met in Chicago to discuss their participation in the Polonia Abroad Convention planned to be held in May 1927 in Warsaw. PRCUA was to be represented by its president, vice president and chaplain. The administration also decided to organize the first PRCUA trip to

Poland and Rome, which was to be combined with the participation of the PRCUA delegation at the convention in Warsaw.

The Polonia Abroad Convention was cancelled but it was too late to cancel the trip. PRCUA members left for Europe on April 19, 1927. They were warmly greeted everywhere they went in Poland. On June 11, President Kaźmierczak, Chaplain President Celichowski, Vice Żolińska, Editor Stefanowicz and Directors Józef Barć and Szymon Wróblewski were received at an audience by Pope Pius XI in the Vatican. The pope blessed the delegates and the PRCUA. They also met with Vatican Secretary of State Cardinal Pietro Gasparr and other Vatican dignitaries and attended a Mass celebrated by the pope.

On June 21, 1926, President Kaźmierczak and other members of the PRCUA administration attended the first meeting of the PRCUA Women's Division.

On December 27, 1934, PRCUA President Joseph Kania decorated past presidents Stanisław Adamkiewicz, Piotr Rostenkowski, Andrzej Kaźmierczak and Jan J. Olejniczak with the PRCUA medal.

During his tenure, PRCUA membership increased by 58,705 members and its assets increased by \$4,789,038,77; a new card filing system was launched at PRCUA and photographing of applications and various other important documents was introduced; payment of dividends was also initiated; certificates for honorary 100% PRCUA memberships were presented; debts on certificates were cancelled for widows; faster death benefit payments were introduced; first premium payments were abolished for the newly joining members, doctors examination fees were cancelled, and Christmas baskets were distributed to poor members of the PRCUA. Kaźmierczak was the organizer of the first youth club and sports team.

For his services for the Polish Army during the World War I, Kaźmierczak was decorated with the Haller Cross.

Andrzej Kaźmierczak was married to Rozalia Orłowska (daughter of Jan and Ewa.) Their wedding took place in 1896. The couple had nine children: Wiktoria, Bronisława, Agnieszka, Helena, Florentyna, Edward, Henryk, Teodor and Leon, and fourteen grandchildren.

Andrzej Kaźmierczak died on October 23, 1957, after a long illness. The wake was held on Friday, October 25th, at R. Thies Funeral Home in Chicago. A symbolic presidential chair made of white flowers was commissioned by the PRCUA administration, and stood by the de-

ceased's coffin. PRCUA President Kazimierz Kozakiewicz gave a eulogy in memory of Andrzej Kaźmierczak, dedicated patriot, Catholic and Polonia activist, who made great contributions to the development of the PRCUA. PRCUA Secretary General Maria Skoczylas read a funeral resolution as a formal acknowledgment of the relationship issued by the Union, honoring its former president. Fr. Mieczysław Starzyński said the funeral prayers.

The service was attended by PRCUA officers and directors President Kazimierz Kozakiewicz and his wife; Secretary General Maria Skoczylas; Treasurer Józef Pranica and his wife, Attorney William Pinkowski; Medical Director dr. Tadeusz Jasiński and his wife; National Directors Zofia Babiarz, Helena Tadda, Józef Jachimiec, Stanisław Maruszak: Franciszek Litwin: Mikołaj Nowicki; Franciszek Kaliszewski and his wife; past President Jan J. Olejniczak; past Vice Presidents Marta Żolińska; Antonina Czerwińska, Aniela Górny; Zofia Kania, wife of past President late Józef Kania; past Attorney Stanley Kusper; directors; President of Osada 54 Leon Kremped; members of PRCUA Society #263; representatives from Osada 69 and Home Office employees.

The funeral Mass, held on October 26th, at St. Wacław Church in Chicago was celebrated by Rev. Czesław Kansowski, assisted by Rev. Aleksander Baranowski, Rev. Mieczysław Madaj, Rev. Franciszek Wachowski and Rev. Władysław Jasiński, with the presence of PRCUA Chaplain Rev. Feliks J. Kachnowski and Rev. Franciszek J. Pilarek from La Salle, IL. Jadwiga Turalska, a long time Home Office employee, was the soloist, and sang to the accompaniment of organist Mr. Niespodziany.

Honorary guards at the coffin were: K. Kozakiewicz, J. Olejniczak, M. Skoczylas, J. Pranica, M. Bykowska and Z. Babiarz. The coffin was carried by members of Society #263: J. Warzecha, K. Brandys, J. Placek, T. Kozioł, J. Patla, J. Czarnik.

Andrzej Kaźmierczak was laid to rest in a family plot at St. Adalbert Cemetery in Niles, IL.

OHIO PAC BOUNCES BACK WITH A ROARING POLISH CONSTITUTION DAY CELEBRATION

With a spectacular celebration of Polish Constitution Day 2022, the Ohio Division of the Polish American Congress (PAC) came roaring back to life after a hiatus of two years, due to COVID-19. According to all observers, this year's celebration was the biggest, best, with the most vendors, parade participants and publicity seen for many, many years.

The 2022 event was very long in the planning stages. It was Ohio PAC Vice President Bienia who doggedly fought against all odds that this year's celebration would be successful.

THANKS TO THE PRCUA -Bienia wishes to send a huge Thank You to the PRCUA for the generous financial support which arrived early in the planning portions of this project. It was through your PRCUA's generosity that he got the courage to stay with the program. A special word of appreciation is extended to PRCUA President James Robaczewski for his presence on Sunday. He did much to raise the visibility of PRCUA in this region. And a very sincere Thank You is given to the PRCUA Vice President Micheline Jaminski, who is also national treasurer of the PAC, for her guidance and emotional support in working through difficulties of our 501 (c)(3) status.

PUT TOGETHER A TEAM - The first order of business was putting together a team of workers who would commit to seeing the weekend through to its conclusion. For this main task, Bienia recruited Aun-

drea Heschmeyer, President of Marquee Strategic Planning and Inspired Events, as organizer of the festival on April 29, 30 and May 1.

Heschmeyer immediately got to work setting up a computer-based webpage to track and organize all aspects of the program. Bienia then assumed the role of chair of the three-day event.

Still working with a skeleton crew, Heschmeyer and Bienia completed most of the preparations for the big event, which was co-sponsored by the City of Parma's Polish Village Corporation, headed by Kathryn Mabin and Parma Councilwoman Debbie Lime.

BRANDON CHROSTOWSKI IS GRAND MARSHAL - Bienia's nomination of Grand Marshal of the parade, Brandon Chrostowski, was approved with praise from all quarters. Brandon, owner of Edwin's Leadership & Restaurant Institute, embodies the idea of Polish pride, hard work and dedication to our Polish heritage. Having recently returned from feeding the troops on the front lines in the Russian war against Ukraine, Brandon says, "You do not have to go to Poland to experience Poland... because Poland lives in us."

ASSIGN RESPONIBILITIES - Early on, Cathy Katrenich offered to take over the responsibility of organizing the Mass at St. Charles, she was assisted by Barbara Adams. As opening day drew near, Joe Rutkowski was recruited to head the beer sales of the event, and Joe Feckanin came on board late in the planning process to take charge of the

parade line-up on Sunday. With this team in place, the real work began of putting all the arrangements that had been made thus far into action.

MARKETING AND SPON-SORSHIP CAMPAIGNS - In the meantime, Heschmeyer and Bienia continued to work on the marketing and sponsorship campaigns for the event. Heschmeyer engaged a graphic designer to create advertising materials, which included preevent, as well as post-event "Thank You" posters and flyers, letters to sponsors, organizing a database of all merchants in Parma, and another data base listing all possible participants in the weekend's activities, from parade marchers, to food vendors, to merchandise vendors - certainly no small task.

ADVERTISING - In addition, Heschmeyer arranged for advertising to appear on Facebook, along with a 15-second spot to be seen on TV during the week of the festival. Heschmeyer's skillful marketing expertise landed a 4-minute appearance by Mitch Bienia on New Day Cleveland, the popular local TV morning show on Fox TV 8.

The results were impressive. The 2022 Polish Constitution Day program had more sponsors, raising more in donations, and was coupled

with the greatest outreach that this event has ever experienced.

Besides these awesome "firsts" for the PAC, Heschmeyer brought together various factions of the Polish community of greater Cleveland, healing rifts which started long before the memory of present-day Polonia. Under the auspices of the Polish American Congress for the first time in recent memory, all Polish fraternal organizations, Polish veterans groups and Polish schools, as well as the Polish-American Culture Center - all worked together, in cooperation, for the good of Polonia. Congratulations to the Polish-American organizations, and to you, Aundrea Heschmeyer for accomplishing this feat. You deserve to win the "Nobel Peace Prize."

CONCLUSION - In conclusion, the weekend of the great event came, with a very successful conclusion, save for a little confusion at the parade line-up and vendor places at the festival site.

Indeed, the parade gods did smile down on the day of the parade, which weather forecasters predicted a 90% chance of rain, because the 30-minute deluge, which came late in the afternoon, did not dampen the enthusiasm of the crowd at the festival even one bit.

Thanks are also given to Cuyahoga Arts and Culture for awarding a matching grant to Polish Village of Parma for this event.

The Many Feasts of the **Month of June**

The month of June brings with it many great feasts of the Church. I think it is worthwhile to look at a few of them in depth as we strive to grow in holiness.

While June is the month of the Sacred Heart, we start the month this year with the great feast of Pentecost on June 5th, the fiftieth day after Easter. Easter does not have a fixed date on the church calendar, so the feast of Pentecost can fall between May 10th and June 13th.

Pentecost is the great outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and the Blessed Virgin Mary in the Upper Room. In the Acts of the Apostles, we hear a wonderful description of what happened on that day. "And suddenly there came from the sky a noise like a strong driving wind, and it filled the entire house in which they were. Then there appeared to them tongues as of fire, which parted and came to rest on each one of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in different tongues, as the Spirit enabled them to proclaim."

This passage describes to us the beginning of the Church. How great it must have been to be present in that moment. Before Our Lord ascended into heaven, He promised to send the Holy Spirit to be our advocate and guide until he returns in glory. He fulfills this promise on the fiftieth day after His resurrection. We who are baptized and confirmed have received this Spirit and the Spirit's sevenfold gifts. Indeed, this is a great day of rejoicing for us! Knowing the Holy Spirit is with us brings us comfort, especially in an ever-changing world. As we celebrate the feast of Pentecost, may the Holy Spirit lead us forth.

The second feast of this month of June which I would like to highlight is a rather new feast day, celebrated the day after Pentecost, called "Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of the Church." Pope Francis established this obligatory memorial on February 11th, 2018 and it will always fall the day after Pentecost. This new feast has been placed on the universal calendar of the Church and will take precedent over any other memorials which may fall on the Monday after Pentecost. Pope Francis wanted to highlight "the mystery of Mary's spiritual motherhood, which from the awaiting of the Spirit at Pentecost has never ceased to take motherly care of the pilgrim Church on earth."



Pope Francis has stated that he hopes this new memorial will help us root our spiritual lives "firmly on three great realities: The Cross, the Eucharist and the Mother of God." On this feast we rejoice that Mary is both the Mother of Christ and Mother of the Church. This year, we will celebrate this new feast day for the fifth time as we ask Mary, our spiritual mother to be with us our journey to her son's kingdom. Mary, Mother of the Church, pray for us!

Finally, the month of June brings us to the secular celebration of Father's Day, this year on Sunday, June 19th. It is my prayer for all fathers on this, their day, that they model their love for their family after St. Joseph, head of the holy family. A blessed and happy Father's Day to all the dads of our beloved fraternal!

Leczenie może być długotrwałe, bolesne i kosztowne. Coraz częściej dochodzimy do wniosku, że poprawnym pytaniem jest nie, czy zachorujemy, lecz kiedy. Martwimy się co stałoby się z naszą rodziną w momencie jak by nas zabrakło? Jak poradzą sobie z życiem codziennym, z płatnościami, z kosztami pogrzebu?

Rozwiązaniem powyższych problemów może okazać się wykupienie polisy na życie. Ale czy teraz jest to nadal możliwe?

Okazuje się, że tak.

Wiele firm wprowadza ułatwienia pozwalające na wykupienie polisy z agentem w sposób zdalny tzn. przez telefon, tablet lub komputer. Personalne spotkanie z agentem nie jest już niezbędne. Możemy wypełnić aplikację elektronicznie i w ten sam sposób ją podpisać rozmawiając jednocześnie z agentem przez telefon.

Często zastanawiamy się jak dobrać wielkość polisy do naszych potrzeb. Na pierwszy rzut oka wydawałoby się, że przysłowiowe \$50,000-\$100,000 powinno spokojnie rozwiązać sytuację. Niestety w większości sytuacji to tylko pozory. Rozmawiając z agentem powinniśmy dokonać tak zwanej analizy potrzeb (needs analysis). Analiza ta pozwoli określić w bardziej dokładny sposób potrzeby, które powinniśmy zabezpieczyć, by zapewnić normalne funkcjonowanie naszej rodziny w sytuacji, kiedy nas zabraknie.

Co powinniśmy wziąć pod uwagę? Jak wyliczyć poprawnie kwotę na jaką powinniśmy się zabezpieczyć?

Wysokość polisy powinna zależeć na pewno od naszych możliwości finansowych. Wykupienie polisy na życie najczęściej nie wiąże się z jednorazową opłatą tylko ze zobowiązaniem długoterminowym. Kwota, którą będziemy płacić ustalana jest w momencie wystawienia polisy, a jej utrzymanie zależy od ciągłości i rzetelności ubezpieczonego. Wyliczając kwotę zabezpieczenia powinniśmy również wziąć pod uwagę zmianę cen i usług w czasie, czyli krótko mówiąc inflację. Niestety ceny za 10 lub 20 lat nie będą podobne do dzisiejszych. Na przykład ceny pochówku dublują się statystycznie średnio co 10 lat.

Przejdźmy do wyliczeń. Co wziąć pod uwagę?

Po pierwsze zsumujmy kwotę naszego zadłużenia. Dodajmy wysokość pożyczek hipotecznych, samochodowych, szkolnych, kwotę obciążenia kart kredytowych i itp.

Policzmy koszty edukacji naszych dzieci. Wykształcenie jednego dziecka może wiązać się z kwotą zbliżoną do \$400,000. Pomnóżmy ta kwotę przez liczbę dzieci lub wnuków, o których edukację chcielibyśmy zadbać.

Sprawdźmy, ile wynoszą koszty utrzymania obecnego poziomu życia. Ile wydajemy na jedzenie, ubrania, świadczenia i drobne przyjemności. Średnio utrzymuje się by użyć 5-10 krotności powyższej kwoty do zapewnienia obecnego poziomu życia naszej rodziny. Na kilka lat.

Dodajmy dwukrotny, obecny szacunkowy koszt pogrzebu, który obecnie waha się pomiędzy \$15,000, a \$20,000 tak, by zapewnić realność powyższej kwoty w przyszłości.

Na koniec dodajmy kwotę, którą chcielibyśmy przekazać bliskim jako pamiątkę po nas.

Jak widać po zsumowaniu powyższych kwot może okazać się, że początkowe \$50,000-\$100,000 nie wystarczy. Pamiętajmy, że każda sytuacja jest indywidualna i polisy powinny być zawsze dostosowane do potrzeb i możliwości ubezpieczonego. Warto porozmawiać z agentem specjalizującym się w zabezpieczeniu zdrowia, życia i przyszłości, by wziąć pod uwagę pełne spektrum potrzeb i odpowiedzialności.



SOLIDARNI WOBEC ROSYJSKIEJ AGRESJI

Blisko temu, podczas 230. obchodów rocznicy uchwalenia polskiej Konstytucji maja, gościliśmy Warszawie prezydentów Ukrainy, Estonii, Łotwy i Litwy. Nasze państwa



Prezydent Rzeczypospolitej Polskiej Andrzej Duda

łączą więzy sąsiedzkie oraz wspólne wartości, kultura, historia i obecne wyzwania. Symbolem tych więzi jest druga w świecie nowoczesna ustawa zasadnicza, przekształcająca polską demokrację szlachecką w sprawniejszą monarchię konstytucyjną. Niestety, było to działanie spóźnione. Trzy sprzymierzone absolutyzmy, rosyjski, pruski i austriacki, zniszczyły unikalny projekt polityczny i cywilizacyjny, jakim była wolnościowa, wieloetniczna, wielowyznaniowa I Rzeczpospolita. Przodkowie dzisiejszych obywateli państw Europy Środkowo-Wschodniej zostali w większości poddanymi cara. Zmuszono ich do wspierania ekspansji Imperium Rosvjskiego własną krwią, majątkiem i pracą.

Pamiętając o tej lekcji historii, o grabieżach, prześladowaniach, niszczeniu dziedzictwa kulturowego i aktach ludobójstwa, jakich dopuszczały się na naszych narodach Rosja i Związek Sowiecki, a także wobec trwającej od roku 2014 faktycznej okupacji części terytorium Ukrainy przez wojska Federacji Rosyjskiej, jako prezydenci państw naszego regionu podpisaliśmy wtedy uroczystą deklarację. Zaznaczyliśmy w niej, że jednocząca się Europa powinna być otwarta na wszystkie kraje i narody, które podzielają jej wartości, oraz że dla nas wszystkich solidarność narodów, szczególnie przy obecnych zagrożeniach dla naszego wspólnego bezpieczeństwa, jest jednym z kamieni węgielnych pokoju, stabilności, rozwoju (...).

Stwierdzenia te wybrzmiały równie mocno niemal rok później, podczas ponownego spotkania prezydentów Polski, Ukrainy, Litwy, Łotwy i Estonii. Tym razem, 13 kwietnia bieżącego roku, gospodarzem był Prezydent Wołodymyr

Zełenski. Zebraliśmy się w ostrzeliwanym przez rosyjskich najeźdźców Kijowie.

Ponawiane od lat dramatyczne apele o stanowczość i solidarność Europy w obliczu rosyjskiego neoimperializmu nie trafiły do przekonania części elit politycznych naszego kontynentu. Otwarcie deklarowana przez reżim Putina wola odtworzenia - w tej czy innej formie -"więzienia narodów", jakim był Związek Sowiecki, oraz strefy wpływów w dawnych państwach bloku wschodniego; gloryfikowanie komunizmu i Stalina; wprowadzanie ducha rozłamu pośród europejskiej rodziny narodów; próby ingerowania w procedury demokratyczne państw NATO i UE; represje wobec rosyjskich dysydentów oraz skrytobójcze ataki na nich; regularne naruszanie przestrzeni powietrznej i morskiej państw europejskich przez rosyjskie siły zbrojne oraz wrogie działania w cyberprzestrzeni; inwazja na Gruzję w roku 2008 i wojna hybrydowa przeciw Ukrainie w roku 2014; hybrydowy atak z roku 2021, kiedy to podporządkowany Moskwie reżim Łukaszenki przetransportował na Białoruś migrantów z Bliskiego Wschodu, a następnie zmusił ich do forsowania wschodniej granicy Polski, będącej również granicą UE i NATO wszystkie te "dzwony bijące na trwogę" nie przeszkodziły niektórym politykom i liderom opinii mówić o potrzebie "zrozumienia dla Rosji i jej wrażliwości". Nie dowierzano przedstawicielom państw naszego regionu, gdy ostrzegali, że nowe inwestycje infrastrukturalne i kontrakty dotyczące dostaw rosyjskich nośników energii wcześniej czy później zostaną użyte przez Moskwę jako narzędzie brutalnego szantażu. Ostatnie wydarzenia dowiodły, że się nie myliliśmy.

24 lutego 2022 roku stał się cezura w historii świata. Po tragicznym konflikcie w Bośni i Hercegowinie sprzed 30 lat w Europie ponownie rozgorzała wojna. Znów mają miejsce wydarzenia, jakich nie widziano tu od roku 1945. Giną tysiące żołnierzy i cywilów. Bombardowane wsie i miasta znikają z powierzchni ziemi. Rosyjscy agresorzy

nie pozwalają na ewakuację ich mieszkańców. Stosują taktykę terroru i spalonej ziemi. Dopuszczają się rozbojów, gwałtów i tortur także wobec kobiet i dzieci – oraz ludobójczych masowych egzekucji. Trwające dochodzenia prokuratorów Międzynarodowego Trybunału Karnego musza doprowadzić do skazania rozkazodawców i sprawców tych porażających zbrodni przeciwko ludzkości.

Polskie władze, wolontariusze i miliony Polaków od pierwszych chwil wojny pomagają uciekinierom z płonącej Ukrainy. Pomagamy wrócić do domów obywatelom ponad 150 krajów świata. Na terytorium Polski przedostały się blisko 3 miliony osób, z czego pozostały u nas blisko 2 miliony. Sa to głównie kobiety, dzieci i osoby starsze. Choć nazywamy ich gośćmi, a nie uchodźcami, choć znajdują tu schronienie nie w obozach przejściowych, lecz w mieszkaniach prywatnych, w budynkach parafii i zakonów, placówkach opieki zdrowotnej i obiektach użyteczności publicznej, jest to dla nas ogromne wyzwanie. Dla porównania – podczas kryzysu migracyjnego w roku 2015 do Europy przybyło nieco ponad 1,8 miliona osób. Pilnie potrzeba nam wsparcia finansowego, co najmniej takiego, jakie otrzymała Turcja po przyjęciu 3 milionów uchodźców z Bliskiego Wschodu.

Przede wszystkim jednak pomocy potrzebują broniący się przed zbrodniczą agresją Ukraińcy. Potrzeba im sprzętu wojskowego oraz konsekwentnej gospodarczej presji na Rosję – tak aby osłabić jej machinę wojenna.



150. ROCZNICA **ŚMIERCI STANISŁAWA MONIUSZKI**

Stanisław Moniuszko był jednym z najwybitniejszych kompozytorów polskiego romantyz-

ki, uczestnika kampanii napoleońskiej, rysownika i literata oraz Elżbiety z d. Madżarskiej.

Początkową edukacją Stanisława zajmowała się matka. W 1827 r. rodzina przeniosła się do Warszawy, gdzie Stanisław uczył się gry na fortepianie pod kierunkiem Augusta Freyera. Od 1830 r. pobierał nauki u Dominika Stafanowicza w Mińsku. W 1837 r. wyjechał do Berlina, gdzie studiował pod okiem Carla Friedricha Rungenhagena. Po ukończeniu studiów w 1840 r. zamieszkał w Wilnie, ożenił się z Aleksandrą Mullerówną i zaczął dawać koncerty. W Wilnie był także nauczycielem gry na fortepianie i kościelnym organista.

W 1848 r. odbyła się premiera 2aktowej opery Halka. Rozgłos zdobył po premierze 4-aktowej wersji Halki w 1858 r. Rodzina Moniuszków przeniosła się do Warszawy, gdzie Stanisław objął stanowisko dyrektora i organizatora opery. Od 1864 r. pracował również w Instytucie Muzycznym w Warszawie, gdzie wykładał harmonię i kontrapunkt.

Kolejne jego dzieła to Flis (premiera w 1858 r.), Hrabina (1859 r.) i Verbum nobile (1861 r.). Ze względu na wybuch powstania styczniowego, premiera jego kolejnej opery Straszny dwór, napisanej w 1861 r. odbyła się dopiero w 1865 r. Straszny dwór, uznawany jest obok Halki za najwybitniejsze dzieło Moniuszki. Do końca życia ukończył opery Paria i Beata. Komponował też balety, operetki, kantaty, pieśni i muzykę sakralną.

Stanisław Moniuszko zmarł na atak serca 4 czerwca 1872 r. w Warszawie, pochowany jest na Cmentarzu Powazkowskim.
