James Robaczewski, National President of the Polish Roman Catholic Union of America, was presented with the 2022 Heritage Award at the 52nd Polish American Heritage Award Banquet. The event was hosted by the Polish American Congress – Illinois Division on October 30th at Allegra Banquets in Schiller Park, IL.

Over three hundred guests attended the banquet that was the closing event of the Polish American Heritage Month celebrations which are held in Illinois each October.

The program, coordinated by banquet chair and PAC-IL Vice President Bożenna Haszlakiewicz, was led by Łukasz Dudka. National anthems were sung by Nina Romek, accompanied by Mieczyslaw Dziś, Polonia Dance Ensemble music director.

The awards were presented to the recipients by Bożenna Haszlakiewicz and PAC-IL President Michael Niedzinski. Other honorees included: Polish American philanthropist and Honorary Consul Lady Blanka Rosentiel - Life Achievement Award (Jacek Schindler, the director of the American Institute of Polish Culture, received the award on her behalf); Polish Museum of America tour guide and actress Barbara Kożuchowska and founder and director of Ad-Hoc Theater - Artistic Award; president of Financial Wealth Alliance - Dariusz Godlewski, RFC - Business Award; General Manager of Polish Daily News Łukasz Dudka - Business Award; Polish & Slavic Federal Credit Union - Philanthropic Award; Tadeusz Kościuszko School of Polish Language - President's Award.

A special award was presented to Consul Małgorzata Bąk-Guzik from the Consulate General of Poland in Chicago. An announcement was also made that another special recognition was awarded to ABC7 Chicago news anchor Alan Krashesky, who was unable to attend, and would be presented to him personally at a later time.

Speakers included Frank Spula, President of the National PAC and the Polish National Alliance; Consul General of the Republic of Poland in Chicago Pawel Zyzak; Dr. George Otto who read the Polish Heritage Month proclamation sent by Illinois Governor J.B. Pritzker; Consul General of Ukraine Serhiy Koledov, and Chicagoland politicians: Timothy Evans, Ariel Reboyras, Kathy Salvi, Raymond Lopez and Daniel Pogorzelski.

The artistic program was presented by Mirosława Sojka-Topór and Khary "K.F. Jacques" Laurent and the PRCUA Polonia Ensemble, which performed a waltz and a polonaise.



On October 21, at the Moose Lodge in Hamtramck, MI, the PRCUA Gwiazda Dancers hosted their Night at the Races fundraiser. The funds will be used to purchase new and update current Polish folk dress owned by the group. The fundraisers consisted of a series of progressive raffles all within the context of horse racing excitement. There's also some fun with derby hats and race regalia sprinkled in, too. It was exciting to have this fundraiser back after a several year hiatus due to the pandemic. All attendees had a great time.

On October 22, Gwiazda's director Jessica Urban-Wendt was on the CW 50 channel's Community Connect Program, which featured Polish heritage month in Detroit and Michigan. Ms. Urban-Wendt talked about her experiences in Polish folk dance and the ongoing activities of the PRCUA and the PRCUA Gwiazda Dancers. Also interviewed for the program were Richard Walawender, the Honorary Consul for the Republic of Poland in Detroit and Joan

Bittner, the longtime proprietor of the Polish Art Center in Hamtramck, MI. Mrs. Bittner's two daughters are both Gwiazda alumnae and two of her grandchildren are current Gwiazda dancers.

On October 23, the PRCUA Gwiazda Dancers were honored by the Polish American Central Citizens Committee of Detroit in recognition for their contributions to Polonia on their 60th anniversary. Gwiazda's director, Jessica Urban-Wendt, and its choreographer, Basia Nowakowski, were both in attendance at the event and accepted the award on behalf of the members and families of the PRCUA Gwiazda Dancers.

On October 24, the PRCUA Gwiazda Dancers held their regular Monday night practice at General Sikorski PLAV Post #10 in Hamtramck per usual, but something about this week's practice was a little extra spooky. The dancers all came to practice in their Halloween costumes. Following practice, treats were passed out. Safe to say, it was a spooktacular time.

From November 11 to 13, Gwiazda's secretary Nick Nowakowski traveled to Atlanta, GA to participate in a 3-day workshop sponsored by the Polish Folk Dance Association of the Americas (PFDAA) to learn Polish folk dances from the regions of Chełm and Biłgoraj from Anna Iskra, a choreographer from Poland who has extensively researched the culture, dances, history, and dress of

SWCPSD AND WESOŁY LUD: A YEAR IN REVIEW...

One week away from the 35th Anniversary Concert of the Southwest Center of Polish Song and Dance scheduled for March 29, 2020, the shelter-in-place order was implemented due to the Covid-19 pandemic and life as we knew it changed dramatically. All events were cancelled. All preparations were for naught and there was absolutely nothing we could do about it but wait... and wait we did.

In April of 2021, Wesoly Lud cautiously resumed rehearsals thanks to Ss. Cyril and Methodius Parish in Lemont, IL, opening its Parish Center for the dancers to use. Half of the pre-pandemic group returned, those who did not, either went away to college, needed time to adjust to remote learning or failed to comply with the mandates. Those that returned, were ready, willing, and gave it their all. What they lacked in experience, they made up for in enthusiasm and initiative. After all, there were two longawaited alumnae weddings to perform for, two Christmas shows and hopefully a 45th anniversary celebration to work toward.

In September of 2021, Southwest Center of Polish Song and Dance resumed classes when Our Lady of the Woods Parish in Orland Park, Illinois, reopened its doors. Mandates were strictly adhered to and 100 children, masks in tow, returned. Select groups performed at the Opłatek hosted by District 8 in December of 2021 and plans to celebrate the 35th Anniversary were rescheduled for May 1, 2022.

2022 marked the 45th anniversary of Wesoły Lud, but even in January, the uncertainty of the contagious virus loomed and the Winter Dinner Dance was cancelled. At this point, since Wesolv Lud traditionally performs at the SWCPSD shows, it was decided the two groups would celebrate together 80 years of Polish dancing on one stage. At past anniversary concerts, different generations of alumni would return and rehearse for up to three months prior, but this year, marked by such

uncertainty, it was decided that only the current group would perform. That is until four weeks prior to the concert and in a matter of 24 hours, 15 couples of alumni responded to the invitation and volunteered to add their talents to the existing repertoire.

Through the grace of God, our dancers and alumni rose to the challenge and came together to help celebrate Wesoły Lud's 45th anniversary and the 35th of SWCPSD. Who else can boast 80 years of Polish dancing on one stage? Maybe it's true that every cloud has a silver lining.

The concert came to be on Sunday, May 1, at Mother McAuley Theater in Chicago – a mainstay of both groups in the last decade. Resuming her role at the 40th Anniversary concert as emcee, Nicole Bencik-Turkiewicz cited the following reflection of one alumnus (Peter Konopacki) to open the show: "The preservation of Polish culture is a significant component of Wesoły Lud. The Russian invasion of the Ukraine stresses the importance of being an active participant in our Polish culture and heritage lest it be erased. I am proud to have had a part in it." After a moment of silence for Ukraine, the program began with the Kolorowy Polonez performed by the entire cast. The emcee then introduced her mother. Micheline Jaminski, founder, first artistic director and choreographer of both groups. Pani Misia was with child when she organized Wesoły Lud in January of 1977 and that child was Nicole. It was only fitting that since Niki was with her from literally the beginning of Wesoly Lud to this moment, dancing in both groups for many years, they would share the spotlight.

Nicole interviewed alumni of one or both groups who shared their reflections of memories and the impact membership in the groups had on their lives. These included: Anna Kraszewski-Winkler, managing director of SWCPSD; Richard Jaminski, artistic director and choreographer of both groups for 35 years; Jeanine Binkowski-Leonhard, an original Wesołv Lud member; Renee-Bober Kroplewski, Michael Dziadkowiec and Robert Kroplewski.

Throughout the two acts of the concert, the five Southwest Center groups performed two dance and song suites each. The youngest group - KRASNOLUDKI - presented a medley of children's games and then a medley called "Boogie Woogie" (a Polish version of Hokey Pokey); LUDZIKI represented the folk culture of Kurpie and Wielkopolska, while MAŁY LUDEK presented Podlasie and Łowicz medleys; Nowy Sącz and dances and songs from the pastures were performed by MŁODY LUDEK, and WESOŁY LUDEK presented selections from Lublin and the Jazzowa Polka.

As for WESOŁY LUD, the current group performed a Spisz medley and the Country Western Chicago Polka, joined by the alumni for the Eastern Kraków and Rzeszów suites. The Łowicz finale included the entire cast and showcased the magnitude of the celebration of 80 years on one stage.

We were graced with the presence of Consul Agata Grochowska of the Republic of Poland; PRCUA Vice President Micheline Jaminski; Secretary-Treasurer Agnieszka Bastrzyk; Directors from District 8: Elizabeth Dynowski and Myron Cislo; District 7 Director Ewa Cholewinski; Fraternal Coordinator Conrad Wiecek; Magdalena Solarz, the artistic director and choreographer of the Wici Song and Dance Theater; representation from the PRCUA Polonia Ensemble, the Lajkonik Dance Group and the Polish Folk Dance Association of the Americas. PRCUA President James Robaczewski sent a video with his warmest regards and congratulations.

Richard Jaminski is the artistic director and choreographer of both groups. Anna Kraszewski-Winkler is the managing director of the Southwest Center of Polish Song and Dance. Michael Dziadkowiec assisted Pan Rich in Wesoly Lud and is one of the SWCPSD dance instructors. The remaining SWCPSD dance instructors are Danielle Kroplewski, Anna Kraszewski-Winkler, Weronika Niedzielski, and Camilla Steczek. Andrew Handzel, Jakub Niedzielski and Isabelle Pikul were the assistant dance instructors.

After an entire year off, the children worked hard and got right back on track and did a wonderful job! We could not have been prouder. Thank

you to everyone who was a part of this big day and made everything such a beautiful experience. We solv Lud did an outstanding job! Pani Misia and Pan Rich really have shown us how to hold on and be proud of our Polish culture. Bravo!

That might have been the end of a challenging school year for SWCPSD, but Wesoły Lud still had a few summer events to go including the wedding of alumna Kasia (Bialas) and Peter Nowakowski (6/11) and the "Diamonds and Denim" Banquet at PRCUA's 63rd Quadrennial Convention (8/13).

After a short summer break, it was business as usual and both Wesoły Lud and SWCPSD started the new dance season in September. SWCPSD acquired a number of new dancers and Wesoły Lud regrouped for upcoming performances: an ethnic dance program with the Philippine Community at the Polish Museum in October, followed by "Na Góralska Nute" at the Polish Highlanders Hall in November, and the "Barbórka" celebration by the Związek Ślązaków w Ameryce on December 3rd.


cluding Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, New York, Pennsylvania, and Texas.






































ZAJĄCZEK DANCE ENSEMBLE NEWS

LEADERS OF THE POLISH ROMAN **CATHOLIC UNION OF AMERICA**

KAZIMIERZ I. KOZAKIEWICZ

Kazimierz Kozakiewicz was born on July 24, 1900 in Płock, Poland. He came to the United States with his parents

when he was two years old. He was the son of Jan Władysław Kozakiewicz, who was PRCUA Director in Massachusetts (1928-1931).

Kazimierz attended parochial grammar school and then public high school in Lowell, MA. He later completed an ophthalmology degree at Boston University with a PhD. After successfully practicing his profession for several years in Salem, MA, he decided to broaden the scope of his education by supplementing it with courses in engineering.

Kazimierz Kozakiewicz married Kazimiera (née Szczechowicz), and the couple had two sons, Ryszard and Albert. She worked in the Polish American Council office in Boston,

bring their families over to the U.S.

From an early age, Kazimierz was actively engaged in the activities of the Polish Roman Catholic Union of America. He was a member of PRCUA Societies #462, #1049 and #604. At the 41st PRCUA Convention held in 1934 in Springfield, MA, Kazimierz was elected as PRCUA Director, and then reelected to the same position at the 42nd Convention in Wilkes-Barre, PA in 1937.

At the 45th PRCUA Convention in 1950 in Syracuse, NY, Kazimierz Kozakiewicz was elected PRCUA First Vice President.

In Salem, MA, Kozakiewicz was the president of the Political Club, president of many Polish societies, President of PRCUA United Circuits for the state of Massachusetts, President of District 1 of the PRCUA United Circuits for the Region of New England, treasurer of Massachusets Retailer's Opticians Associations, Vice President of New England Fraternal Congress.

After PRCUA President Kania died in 1953 while in office, Vice President Kozakiewicz took over as the interim President, in accordance with the recommendation of the PRCUA Constitution, which pro-

vided that on the death of the current president, the first vice president would take over. He was elected PRCUA President at the 46th PRCUA Convention held in 1954 in Pittsburgh, PA. Kozakiewicz launched his presidency of the PRCUA with a clearly

established outline of what he hoped to accomplish for the greater expansion of the oldest Polish American organization in the U.S.

As the President of the Polish Roman Catholic Union of America, Kozakiewicz was involved in working closely with the Polish American Council (Rada Polonii Amerykańskiej) and supported campaigns to aid Poland and its citizens.

In 1957, Kozakiewicz was invited to President Dwight Eisenhowers' inauguration. While in Washington, D.C., he conducted a series of conferences with U.S. Congressmen, discussing the issue of helping Poland.

At the banquet organized on the occasion of Kozakiewicz's birthday in July 1958 at the Sheridan Hotel, PRCUA chaplain Fr. Kachnowski presented Kozakiewicz with PRCUA Gold Medal of Merit in recogniton of his work for the organization.

During his presidency, PRCUA juvenile membership fell off drastically, as Polish American children switched to the more popular English language American Boy Scout and Girl Scout programs. Despite Pres. Kozakiewicz's valiant efforts to rejuvenate juvenile membership, he was not successful. The PRCUA scouting programs ended in the mid 1950s. Nevertheless, many families still wanted their children to learn Polish and become familiar with their Polish heritage. Therefore, with schools established by V.P. Aniela

Gorna as an example, the PRCUA supported the establishment of more Polish language schools and Polish folk dance groups.

In 1954, PRCUA rejoined the Polish American Congress under the direction of President Kozakie-

In 1955, the PRCUA participated in the commemoration of the 35th anniversary of the 1920 Battle of Warsaw. A huge gathering was held in Humboldt Park in Chicago to mark this historic occasion.

Kozakiewicz was a member of the Polish Museum of America Board, director of the Northwestern Savings and Loan in Chicago and a deputy assessor of Cook County in Illinois.

Kazimierz Kozakiewicz died on March 27, 1968. PRCUA issued a mourning resolution. PRCUA Executive officers and directors as well as the members of the PRCUA Convention Budget Committee and Qualification and Nomination Committee who attended the meeting in Chicago attended the farewell ceremony held on March 30 at the Koop

POLISH NEWS BYTES

Long-obstructed geothermal facility opens in Toruń - After long years of planning, building and combating political opposition, a geothermal facility proving low-cost heating and electricity has opened in the northcentral city of Toruń. It is the brain child of Redemptorist priest Father Tadeusz Rydzyk, a well-known Catholic educator and media pioneer. Geothermia taps into subterranean "hot springs" for heating and power generation but requires extensive, complicated infrastructure to function.

Inflation cripples Poland's hospitality industry - Inflation, triggered by Russia's energy manipulation and war on Ukraine, has adversely affected Poland's hospitality industry. A survey conducted by the Polish hotel industry's Chamber of Commerce has shown that in October 35% of the country's hotels had

a 70% vacancy rate and 20% had only half of their rooms booked up. That is much below the pre-pandemic level when reservations were often difficult to book ahead of the yearend holiday season. That may be good news only for Polish Americans planning to spend Christmas in Poland this year.

Abandoned in Poland, the Orient Express will travel again - From 1883 to 1977, nobles, wealthy tycoons, cultural figures, diplomats and an occasional spy traveled from Paris to Istanbul in elegance and luxury aboard the legendary Orient Express. Later, the route was progressively shortened until 2008 when the train was taken out of service entirely. In 2015, seventeen of its carriages were found abandoned in Poland near the Belarusian border and were purchased by the French hotel group Accor. The painstakingly restored train is due to resume its traditional route in 2025.

WIGILIA IS WHERE IT'S AT

Compared to the way most nations celebrate Christmas, probably the single most unique feature about Polish-style Yule is the singular importance attached to December 24th. Although the Christmas season starts on the first Sunday of Advent and stretches on through the Three Kings (January 6th) all the way to Candlemas (February 2nd), the main event of Polish-style Christmas has always been (and hopefully always will be) Wigilia, Christmas Eve.

It is not only the climax, high point and main focus of the entire season but the single most important day of the year. It has been said that is because it combines the thing Poles cherish the most: God, family and country. God is present in the numerous nativity motifs (hay, opłatek, fasting, kolędy, the star symbol, Midnight Mass) that permeate the festivities. The family is in its element, for this evening should be celebrated with one's nearest of kin. And the patriotic dimension is enhanced by the uniqueness of this celebration which sets Poles apart from other ethnic groups.

It is on Wigilia that everything really important about Christmas occurs. Everything that precedes it (Advent, St. Nicholas Day) is merely a buildup to Wigilia. Everything that comes afterwards, Christmas Day included, is an anti-climax and alsoran. Everything about the day is special, unique and surrounded by legend. "How you are on Christmas Eve you will be the whole year" --goes a common belief urging youngsters to be on their best behavior. To get a scolding or spanking on that

day would mean looking forward to more of the same throughout the New Year.


The wieczerza wigilijna or Christmas Eve supper is the year's most symbolic and festive family gathering. In memory of the Christ Child's humble bed, hay is scattered over the table-top before being covered with a pure white (non-patterned) tablecloth. Everyone dons his or holiday finery, awaiting the evening's first star to appear - the sign for things to begin. Preschool youngsters are often given that job to keep them busy and out of the way during last minute preparations. The meal begins with the eldest family member leading grace and then breaking and sharing the opłatek with all present, wishing them all the best during the Christmas season and in the year to come. The procedure continues until everyone has shared bits of opłatek and exchanged wishes with everyone else.

The supper itself comprises an odd number or (in some regions and families) 12 meatless dishes, some of them served only this one time a year. Typical foods include herring and other fish, mushrooms, sauerkraut, pierogi and other pasta dishes, with sweet follow-ups containing poppyseed, honey, nuts and dried fruit. Traditionally the meal should contain a sampling of the things that fields, forests and rivers have to offer. After supper, koledy are sung and gifts are exchanged, but getting presents is not really a big part of traditional Polish Yuletide. The crowning of a magnificent evening of family warmth and traditional symbolism is Pasterka, the Shepherd's Mass at midnight.

Once again, I find myself saying I can't believe that Christmas is just around the corner. Believe it or not, we are on the threshold of another Christmas season and with it, the continuing battle to turn the Christmas

season into a winter holiday, devoid of any religious meaning. The signs of this reality are all around us if you stop and look. Nativity scenes banned from public display, the saying "Merry Christmas" being replaced with "Happy Holidays", our public school children not allowed to sing any religious carols at the annual Christmas program and the list goes on and on. With this in mind, how do we keep Christ in Christmas? Here are some ways to keep this Christmas, Christ-centered in an ever-changing world.

- 1. Take the time to celebrate Advent with your family; it is the season of preparation for Christmas. Buy or make an Advent wreath and place it on your family table, lighting the candles at meal time. This can be accompanied by a simple prayer such as "Lord, prepare my heart to greet you at Christmas." Explain the Advent season to your children, reminding them that it is the season to prepare our hearts to meet the Lord by works of charity and kindness.
- As part of the Advent preparations, decorate your home for Christmas in a way that reflects the real reason of the season: Jesus Christ. Let Santa and the reindeers take a back seat to the Newborn King. This can be done by making sure your Nativity scene is placed in the most prominent place in your home. Gather the family together after you return from Christmas Mass and place the Christ Child in the manger and sing a Christmas carol or kolęda as a family.
- When sending out your Christmas cards this year, purchase those that are religious in nature. This simple gesture reminds others of the true meaning of the Christmas season, Jesus Christ.
- Display an outdoor Nativity scene on your lawn, porch or in your window to remind others of the meaning of this season. Displaying a Nativity scene helps bring home the point of Christmas season, the birth of our Savior.
- When mailing your Christmas cards to family and friends, purchase the religious Christmas stamp that is issued by the post office. It's the only time of the year that you can buy a religious stamp in these United States. I often buy extras and use them throughout the New Year as a way of spreading the "good news" in a simple yet very real way.
- Continue the age-old custom of Wigilia in your family or restart it if it has been lost. This is one of the most meaningful customs of the Polish American domestic Church. This meatless vigil meal is centered on Christ and family. It moves us from the family table, where we are nourished physically to the altar table where we are nourished spiritually by Jesus Christ himself, body, blood, soul and divinity. There is no better way to open the Christmas season than with this timeless tradition of love. If that is not possible, at least share the *Opłatek*, the Christmas wafer of love, with those who celebrate with you on Christmas Eve, Christmas Day or those who come to your home during the Christmas season.
- Finally, keep at least the twelve days of Christmas, from Christmas Day to the Feast of the Epiphany on January 6th, as a time of joy and

celebration to emphasize that Christmas has a season which begins, not ends on Christmas Day! Keep the Christmas tree up and the house decorated and celebrate the wonders of this holy season. The Church gives us this Christmas season as a time to celebrate God's love for us. On the old Church calendar, the Christmas season lasted forty days until the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord on February 2nd. Many still keep this tradition, especially in Poland and in Polish American areas as well as other parts of Europe, so why not give it a try?

I hope you will consider some of these ideas as ways to keep your Christmas, this Christmas, Christ-centered. I know it will enrich your celebration and help restore the beauty of this season of divine love!

CLEAR BEETROOT BORSCHT

(czysty barszcz czerwony): Soak 2-3 dried bolete mushrooms in 1 c. warm water several hrs, cook in same water until tender and set aside. Peel and coarsely grate 1 lb. beets, pre-baked in oven until fork-tender and cool enough to handle, and combine with 5 c. vegetable stock. Add the mushroom liquid, 1 large, peeled, coarsely-grated apple. Bring to boil and simmer 2 min. Add 1 bud crushed garlic and (optional) 1/4 c. dry red wine. Strain, discarding contents of sieve. Season soup to taste with salt, pepper, lemon juice and a little sugar until you achieve just the right tangy taste you want. Serve in bowls with traditional uszka (ear-dumplings).

LITTLE-EAR DUMPLINGS (uszka): Save mushroom stock for clear mushroom soup (below). Soak 1 slice French bread in 1/2 c. warm water. Chop and sauté 1 coarsely-chopped onion in 2 Tbs. butter until tender and lightly browned. Pass mushrooms, onion and squeezed-out presoaked bread through food chopper or process briefly. Add 1/4 c. bread crumbs, stir in 1 egg white, salt & pepper to taste and mix well. Filling should be on the stiff side, so if it's mushy, stir in a little more bread crumbs and set aside. Sift 1 c. flour onto bread-board, work in egg yolk and just enough water (roughly ½ c.) to bind ingredients into a dough. Knead until smooth, roll out very

thin and cut into 1-1/2" squares. Place a little filling on each square, fold 2 opposite points together to form a triangle and pinch shut. Gently pull 2 ends of the triangle, join into a ring and pinch them together. Cook in lightly-salted boiling water without crowding until uszka float up. Remove with slotted spoon and serve.

CARP à la JEWISH STYLE (karp po żydowsku): Cut cleaned carp into 1 in. steaks, salt, pepper, sprinkle with 4-5 crushed cloves and 1 Tbs vinegar. Cover and refrigerate for 1 hour. In a large skillet, place 3 Tbs butter and 2 chopped onions and simmer stirring occasionally until tender but not browned. Add 1/2 cup beer, bring to boil. Add fish, cover and simmer on low heat for about 30 minutes. Add 1/3 cup or more raisins and 1/2 Tbs grated lemon rind. Simmer briefly and serve.

TROUT WITH MUSHROOMS (pstrag z pieczarkami): Rinse 4 dressed rainbow trouts (with heads attached), pat dry, sprinkle with salt & pepper, dredge in flour and fry in 1/2" hot oil on both sides until done to a nice golden-brown. Meanwhile, in 2 Tbsp. butter sauté 8 oz. fresh, washed, white, sliced mushrooms until fully cooked. Turn trout onto lettuce-lined platter, garnish with mushrooms, placing some into cavities, decorate with lemon slices and parsley sprigs and serve.

RICE & FRUIT DESSERT (ryż z owocami): Transfer 4 c. hot cooked rice to serving platter, dot with butter and top with fruit topping of choice: stewed fruit, canned cherry or applepie filling, strawberry or cherry preserves or powidła - Polish imported plum butter. Variation: Cooked barley may be substituted for the rice.

SYMBOLISM OF THE POLISH WIGILIA DISHES

For centuries, all Christmas Eve dishes served on the Polish table had some meaning.

- Fish is a sign of Jesus Christ, and more specifically of rebirth and baptism. Its presence on the Christmas Eve table was also supposed to ensure harmony and peace in the new liturgical year.

- Honey gave joy, happiness, prosperity and long life. Honey dishes were to give the guests the favor of supernatural forces.
- Peas in Christmas Eve dishes were to herald fertility, harvest and money.
- Poppy seeds were supposed to bring wealth, so eating dishes with poppy seeds on Christmas Eve was supposed to ensure prosperity for the household next year.
- Plums was a symbol of longevity and prosperity, protection from evil and obstacles.

VERONICA LATTA SMITH 1925-2022


Veronica Latta Smith passed away peacefully at home in Grosse Ile on November 13 at the age of 97.

She was born January 13, 1925, in Wyandotte, MI, to her Polish parents, Jan and Helena Latta, who established the Latta Feed Store. She was preceded in death by her siblings Laurence, Edmund, Helen, Eddie, Sophia, Mary, and Wanda.

Veronica worked for Great Lakes Steel during World War II to help pay for college at the University of Michigan. There she earned her sociology degree in 1948, beginning nearly 80 years of dedication to the school. She met her late husband, Stewart G. Smith, a graduate of U. of M. Law School, on a double date. Stew arranged this date because Veronica was dating a friend of his and he wished to make her acquaintance. They married in 1952 and had six children, all of whom attended the University of Michigan along with eight of their thirteen grandchildren.

Veronica's work varied throughout her life following graduation. She was a teacher, owner of Latta Insurance Agency and gift shop proprietor. Ronnie became director of the Martha Cook Board of Governors at U of M and served on other alumni boards. In 1984, she was elected to the University of Michigan Board of Regents. She was known as the "Students' Regent." Her advocacy for students was recognized by the Michigan Student Assembly in 1992, a first for a regent. In addition to this commendation, she was honored to have met four U.S. presidents through her service to the University.

Veronica, as Regent Emerita, continued to participate in University c o m - m e n c e-ments and attended football



Veronica is survived by her six children: Dr. S. Gregory and Martha Smith of Yorklyn, DE; Dr. Patrick and Karen Smith of Columbia, MO; Paul Smith of Los Angeles, CA; Alison Hurley and her late husband James Hurley of Scottsdale, AZ; Alisa and Steve Lyons of Grosse Ile, MI; and Glenn and Marie Smith of Grand Rapids, MI. Also, thirteen grandchildren Ryan, Brett, Matt, Kyle, Kelly, Holly, Tracy, Shelby, Samantha, Jack, Casey, Suzanne, and Doug, and 4 great-grandchildren Carson, Fritz, Lola, and Milo. The diversity of her children's lives and careers speaks to Veronica as a passionate, caring mother who emphasized the importance of education and the value of a close-knit, loving family.

A funeral mass was conducted at Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Grosse Ile, MI on Saturday, November 19.

ZŁOTY JUBILEUSZ BALU "KOPCIUSZEK I KSIĄŻĘ"

Ponad 500 gości wzięło udział w jubileuszowej 50. edycji Balu "Kopciuszka i Księcia", który odbył się 19 listopada w eleganckiej sali Belvedere Chateau w Palos Hills, IL. Doroczny bal organizowany jest od 1972 roku przez Grupę Kulturalną Dorosłych, działającą przy Zjednoczeniu Polskim Rzymsko-Katolickim w Ameryce (ZPRKA/PRCUA) od 1969 roku.

Tradycją balu jest wybór drogą loterii "Kopciuszka" i "Księcia" oraz pary wiceksiążęcej, którzy przez rok reprezentować będą PRCUA podczas oficjalnych uroczystości organizowanych wśród Polonii chicagowskiej. Rok 2023 jest szczególnie prestiżowym rokiem, ponieważ PRCUA obchodzi 150-lecie istnienia. Kandydaci biorący udział w balu są uczniami szkół średnich i członkami PRCUA. Za udział w balu wszyscy otrzymują stypendia na studia, ufundowane przez Grupę Kulturalną Dorosłych.

Bal poprzedziły wielotygodniowe przygotowania, w tym nauka tańców, do których układy taneczne przygotował utalentowany choreograf Ryszard Jamiński. Państwo Micheline i Ryszard Jamińscy są zaangażowani w artystyczny program balu od 1976 roku. Młodzież, która tradycyjnie zaprezentowała się w galowych strojach - kandydatki w długich białych sukniach, a kandydaci w czarnych smokingach – zafascynowała gości balu perfekcyjnie wykonanymi układami tanecznymi i elegancją.

Gości powitała dyrektor krajowa Dystryktu 8 PRCUA Elizabeth Dynowski, program prowadzili Danielle Kroplewski i Thomas Frankowicz. Swoje refleksje przekazała Książęca Para 2022 roku – Natalia Bafia i Marcel Duda. Wśród gości tegorocznego balu obecni byli między innymi: bp Andrzej Wypych, biskup pomocniczy diecezji Chicago; wicekonsul RP w Chicago Jacek Bryniak z żoną Moniką; prezes Kongresu Polonii Amerykańskiej - Oddział na stan Illinois, Michael Niedzinski; prezes Muzeum Polskiego w Ameryce, Richard Owsiany oraz przedstawiciele PRCUA: członkowie zarządu PRCUA - prezes James Robaczewski z żoną Elaine, wiceprezes Micheline Jaminski z mężem Ryszardem, sekretarz-skarbnik Agnieszka Bastrzyk z mężem Danielem, kapelan naczelny ks. kanonik Władysław Ptak; dyrektorzy krajowi Joanna Cholewiński, Elizabeth Dynowski, Myron Cislo z żoną Elizabeth i Elizabeth Sadus oraz radca prawny John Chitkowski z żoną Kerry.

Hymny narodowe wykonali Anna Ray i Alan Królikowski. Wicekonsul Jacek Bryniak odczytał gratulacje nadesłane przez konsula generalnego RP w Chicago, Pawła Zyzaka. Modlitwę przed rozpoczęciem balu odmówił ks. kanonik Władysław Ptak, kapelan PRCUA i proboszcz parafii Our Lady-Sorrows w Farmington, MI, a modlitwę na zakończenie ks. Sebastian Żebrowski, wikariusz parafii Pięciu

Braci Męczenników w Chicago. Uroczysty toast wzniósł prezes Grupy Kulturalnej Dorosłych, Edward Muszalski. W czasie obiadu utwory muzyczne i wokalne wykonali: Alan Królikowski (tenor), Nicole Kwasny (skrzypce) i Yousseff El Yakine (pianino).

Dwa wyjątkowe akcenty wywołały szczególne emocje w czasie balu. Pierwszym było wystąpienie Johna Oćwiei, syna Reginy Oćwieji, jednej z założycielek Grupy Kulturalnej Dorosłych i byłej wiceprezes PRCUA, której wizja "służby dla młodzieży PRCUA" zaowocowała organizacją dorocznych balów "Kopciuszka i Księcia". Drugim szczególnym momentem było przedstawienie przez panią Micheline Jamiński ponad osiemdziesięciu byłych zwycięzców tytułów książęcych i wiceksiążęcych oraz kandydatów z ostatnich 50 lat. Niektórzy z nich z duma zaprezentowali na tegorocznym balu swoje dzieci, które ubiegały się o tytuł "Kopciuszka" i "Księcia". Historia tego wyjątkowego balu zatoczczyła koło, a młodzi uczestnicy wiernie kontynuują kilkupokoleniową już tradycję.

Po obiedzie pani Jamińska podziękowała członkom zarządu Grupy Kulturalnej Dorosłych, którzy od wielu lat kierują działalnością grupy: prezesowi Edwardowi Muszalskiemu, wiceprezesowi Johnowi Frankowiczowi i skarbnikowi Walterowi Dynowskiemu za wieloletnią opiekę nad działalnością grupy oraz kontynuację dorocznych balów. Podziękowania skierowała również do dwóch członkiń Grupy Kulturalnej Dorosłych, pani Mary Brzeźniak i pani Diane Cortesi, które biorą aktywny udział działaności grupy od

momentu jej założenia aż do dziś.

Głównym wydarzeniem wieczoru była uroczysta prezentacja kandydatów, wprowadzanych na salę przez rodziców, a przedstawianych przez "Kopciuszka" i "Księcia" sprzed dwóch lat - Karolinę Gal i Artura Rykałę. Po prezentacji ks. biskup Andrzej Wypych pobłogosławił czekające na zwycięzców korony oraz wszystkich kandydatów, po czym przystąpiono do najbardziej oczekiwanego przez wszystkich momentu - losowania tegorocznych zwycięzców. Kartkę z nazwiskiem "Kopciuszka" wylosował prezes James Robaczewski, a kartkę z nazwiskiem "Ksiecia" wicprezes Micheline Jamiński. Nazwiska pary wiceksiążecej losowała sekretarzskarbnik Agnieszka Bastrzyk. Kopciuszkiem 2023 wybrana została Magdalena Truta, a Księciem 2023 Eric Wildhirt. Tytuły wiceksiążęce otrzymali Karolina Mikulec i Jakub Niedzielski. Zwycięskie pary zatańczyły walca, do którego włączyli się wszyscy tegoroczni kandydaci, ich rodzice, a następnie goście.

Jubileuszowy 50. Bal "Kopciuszka i Księcia" przejdzie do historii Grupy Kulturalnej Dorosłych PRCUA i historii działalności chicagowskiej polonii. Grupie Kulturalnej Dorosłych życzymy kolejnych 50. lat chlubnej "służby dla młodzieży", a zwycięzcom tegorocznego balu oraz wszystkim kandydatom, wielu sukcesów i kontynuacji pięknej tradycji, zainicjowanej pół wieku temu przez ich dziadków i rodziców.

Medicare Part A i B - Ceny i pokrycia na 2023 rok

Center for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) podało do publicznej wiadomości wysokość opłat i pokryć (premium, deductible i coinsurance) części A i B Medicare na rok 2023.

Medicare Part A Premium/Deductible

Medicare Part A pokrywa częściowo między innymi koszty związane z pobytem w szpitalu, skilled nursing facility jak również koszty związane z niektórymi serwisami domowymi. Około 99% posiadaczy Medicare nie posiada miesięcznej stawki za cześć A z uwagi na to, że mają przepracowane (oni lub ich małżonkowie) przynajmniej przez 40 kwartałów i płacili składki na Medicare.

Udział własny (deductible) za pobyt w szpitalu w roku 2023 wynosi \$1,600. Wzrósł on o \$44 w stosunku do roku ubiegłego. Deductible części A zawiązane z pobytem w szpitalu pokrywa koszty pierwszych 60 dni pobytu w szpitalu serwisów pokrywanych przez Medicare. W 2023 beneficjenci Medicare części A są również odpowiedzialni za udział wspólny (coinsurance) w wysokości \$400 za każdy dzień pomiędzy 61, a 90 dniem pobytu

w szpitalu (\$11 dziennie więcej niż w roku bieżącym) i \$800 (\$778 w 2022) za dzień w tzw. rezerwie życiowej (lifetime reserve).

Dla beneficjentów przebywających w skilled nursing facilities, dzienna dopłata za udział wspólny (coinsurance) za pobyt między dniem 21, a setnym wynosi \$200 na 2023 rok (\$194.50 w 2022).

Osoby wchodzące w 65 rok życia, które nie wypracowały jeszcze 40 kwartałów lub nie otrzymały renty inwalidzkiej (disability) będą odpowiedzialne za miesięczna opłatę za część A Medicare. Osoby, które przepracowały nie mniej niż 30 kwartałów lub są współmałżonkami osoby, która przepracowała nie mniej niż 30 kwartałów będą odpowiedzialne za stawkę miesięczną w wysokości \$278 za część A w roku 2023. Niektóre osoby w wieku powyżej 65 lat, które przepracowały mniej niż 30 kwartałów lub maksymalnie wykorzystały benefity wynikające z renty inwalidzkiej są odpowiedzialne za pełną opłatę za część A w wysokości \$506 miesięcznie.

Medicare Part B Premium/Deductible

Medicare part B pokrywa częściowo koszty związane z wizytami lekarskimi, poza szpitalnymi serwisami medycznymi, niektórymi domowymi serwisami medycznymi nie pokrywanymi przez część A.

Podstawowa miesięczna stawka za Part B Medicare na rok 2023 wynosi \$164.90, co oznacza ze jest niższa o \$5.20 niż w roku 2022. Roczna odpowiedzialność własna (deductible) za Part B w roku 2023 wynosi \$226, \$7 mniej niż w roku 2022.

Od 2007 miesięczna stawka z Part B jest również bazowana w zależności od poziomu dochodów beneficjenta. Grupa osób dotknięta podwyżką związaną z wysokim poziomem dochodów wynosi około 5%. Ceny części B dla osób o wysokich dochodach przedstawione są w poniższej tabeli.
