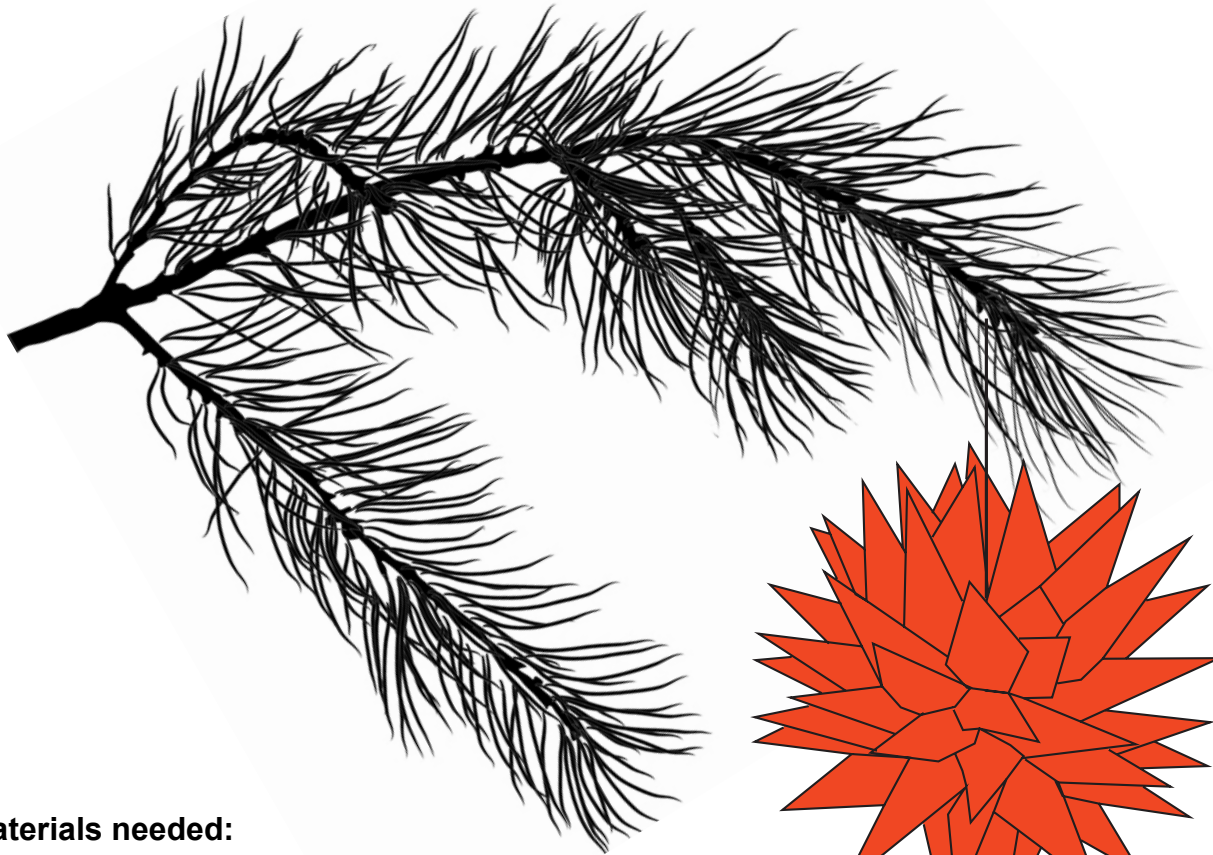


Porcupine

Jezyk



Materials needed:

- Solid or patterned paper, not heavy
- Scissors
- Glue
- Two beads or 1/2 inch round discs of cardboard
- Needle and strong sewing thread
- Nickel

Trace and cut 10-12 circles (pattern A). Fold each circle in half, then in half twice more. Unfold, place nickel in center of circle, and draw lines on crease marks up to nickel. Cut each line, leaving a nickel-sized circle in the middle.

Place the point of a sharpened pencil toward the outer edge of a cut section. Roll tightly around the pencil and glue down corner. Glue sticks work well for this, as do toothpicks dipped in a small dollop of craft or school glue. Hold for a few seconds to allow glue to stick before continuing to next point. Continue making points until circle is completed.

Make 10 or 12 circles, depending on thickness of paper. Thread a bead or cardboard disc on the thread, then poke needle through centers of all circles. Pull tightly and add second bead or cardboard disc and knot tightly. Use excess thread to make a loop for hanging on tree.

Alternate options: Make two circles with points, glue back-to-back, and decorate centers with cotton ball or large craft sequin. For an elegant option, evenly apply glue to each point and sprinkle evenly with glitter.
