





60th Anniversary Mass of PRCUA Father Al's Society #1493



Detroit, MI - On Saturday, November 7, 2015 members of PRCUA Father Al's Society #1493 are invited to attend the Society's 60th Anniversary Mass at St. Cunegunda Church located at 5900 St. Lawrence, Detroit Michigan 48210. Mass will begin at 3:30 p.m. Friends of the PRCUA and others are also encouraged to attend.

In honor of the founder and first pastor of St. Cunegunda Parish, Rev. Alexander S. Wilczewski, Stanley Mardeusz organized Father Al's Society in the Fall of 1955. After months of planning, this fraternal benefit society conducted its first meeting on December 11, 1955. The first elected officers were: Rev. Alexander S. Wilczewski (Chaplain), Roman Bochenek (President), Gregory Rosinski (Vice-President), Anthony R. Ozog (Recording Secretary), Mitchell H. Mazur (Financial Secretary) and Leonard Sienkowski (Treasurer).

Wilczewski The purpose of the Society was to honor the founder of St. Cunegunda Church and to promote sports, good fellowship and scholastic achievements. For many years the Society undertook the sponsorship of both boys' and girls' athletic teams for the students at St. Cunegunda School. The Society also sponsored the Fr. Al's Softball League that started in 1956 with three teams and grew to twenty teams in the 1980 season. Educational grants were presented to members of Fr. Al's Society and donations from various fund raising affairs assisted institutions such as the Polish Museum of America, located in Chicago Illinois, as well as St. Mary's College in Orchard Lake, Michigan.

Throughout the years, members in the Society participated in numerous National Tournaments of the Polish Roman Catholic Union of America (Golf, Softball, Bowling and Basketball), as well as performing in various Polish dance groups that are supported through monetary donations by Fr. Al's Society.

In December 1988, St. Francis Society #1077 merged with Fr. Al's Society. This membership added to the Society's growth.

Today, Fr. Al's Society is still one of the active societies in Michigan. Members still participate in National PRCUA Tournaments and younger members still participate in Polish dancing. The Society still hosts National Tournaments and still provides assistance to Society college bound members through educational grants.

The present Officers of Fr. Al's Society are: Joseph Ozog Jr. (President), Linda Mikus (Vice-President), Courtney Ozog (Recording Secretary) and Mary Ann Shelton (Treasurer/Financial Secretary).

Facts about Fr. Alexander S. Wilczewski: Born - August 25, 1896, Ordained - September 10, 1922, 1st Pastor of St. Cunegunda - August 3, 1927, Died - November 8, 1963.



Recipe Corner THANKSGIVING SIDE DISHES

CRANBERRY-PEAR MOUSSE - Wash and dry 1 lb. of cranberries. Peel 1 lb. of sweet, juicy pears, discard seeds and cut into cubes. Place fruit in a pot and simmer on high, then reduce the heat and simmer on medium for about 1 hour. All the fruit juice must evaporate and create a "marmalade". Cool the fruit and blend with a hand blender, then mush through a strainer to get the consistency of mousse. Serve chilled. The mousse is a perfect addition to the Thanksgiving turkey! It has a slightly sour-tart taste of cranberries mitigated by sweet pears. The exact proportion of cranberries and pears may be varied according to your own taste.

TRADITIONAL BREAD STUFFING - Preheat oven to 325° F. Chop 1 1/2 c. of celery and 1 c. onion. In a large skillet cook celery and onion in 1/2 c. of butter or margarine over medium heat until tender but not brown. Remove from heat. Stir in 1 Tbsp. of snipped fresh sage or 1 tsp. of poultry seasoning and 1/4 tsp. of pepper. Place 12 c. of dry bread cubes in large bowl; add onion mixture. Drizzle with 1 c. chicken broth; toss lightly to combine. Place stuffing in a 2-quart casserole dish. Bake, covered, for 30 to 45 minutes or until heated through.

ROASTED BRUSSEL SPROUTS WITH PECANS - Preheat oven to 400° F. Place 2 lbs. Brussels sprouts, 1 c. coarsely chopped pecans, 2 Tbsp. olive oil, and 2 cloves of finely chopped garlic onto a large baking sheet. Sprinkle with salt and pepper to taste and toss the ingredients together until well combined and coated with oil. Spread out into a single layer, and turn the Brussels sprouts to face cut sides down. Roast until golden brown and tender, about 20 to 25 minutes.

CRANBERRY ORANGE BREAD - Preheat oven to 350° F. Grease an 8 1/2x4 1/2-inch loaf pan. In a large bowl, combine 2 c. flour, 3/4 c. sugar, 1 1/2 tsp. baking powder, 3/4 tsp. salt, and 1/2 tsp. baking soda. Stir 1/4 c. butter, cut into small chunks, into flour mixture until combined. Add 3/4 c. orange juice, 1 Tbs. orange zest, and 1 egg; mix well. Fold in 1 c. chopped cranberries and 1/2 c. chopped walnuts (optional). Spoon batter into the prepared pan. Bake until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean, about 60 to 75 minutes. Cool in the pan for 10 minutes before removing.

Dr. Thaddeus Radzilowski Honored

Grosse Pointe, MI - Dr. Thaddeus Radzilowski was honored with a special tribute by his family, friends and colleagues at a banquet held in the banquet hall at St. Aborose Chuche in Grosse Pointe, MI on Septembr 12, 2015.

Dr. Radzilowski is a historian, President and co-founder of the Piast Institute, a national research center devoted to Polish and Polish American affairs. He is President Emeritus of Saint Mary's College of Ave Maria University in Orchard Lake, Michigan. He has taught at Madonna University, Heidelberg College and Southwest Minnesota State University in Minnesota, and lectured widely in Europe and North America. He was named Professor Emeritus of History at Southwest Minnesota State University in 1997.

Dr. Radzilowski has written extensively on the history of Russia and East Central Europe and migration from East Central Europe, with special emphasis on social history and historiography. He has published more than 100 monographs, edited collections Journal articles, book chapters, scholarly papers, and articles.

Prof. Radzilowski has been appointed to a number of commissions and boards and received numerous awards and medals including the Cavalier's Cross of the Polish Order of Merit awarded by the President of Poland (1999).

Dr. Radzilowski is a member of many Polish organizations including the Kosciuszko Foundation, Polish National Alliance, Polish Roman Catholic Union of America (Soc. #798) and Polish American Congress. The PRCUA congratulates Dr. Radzilowski for his many meaningful contributions to Polonia.

Fallen Heroes Project to Honor Polish Soldiers

Robert Michalak of Redmond, Washington is American born and raised. His grandparents immigrated from Poland in 1914 and his family has kept ties with Polish relatives ever since. Michalak has visited Poland more than a dozen times during his lifetime, and although he loves the country of his ancestors he never expected to be helping Polish war heroes.

It was Michalak's service in the U.S. Army that ultimately led him down an unexpected path, one in which he would meet artist Michael Reagan of the Fallen Heroes Project. The Fallen Heroes Project provides, free to the family, a portrait of those who have given their life in the fight on terrorism in Iraq and Afghanistan. Reagan draws each portrait from a photograph provided by the family. He then ships it to them, again at no charge. To date he has completed 4,200 portraits.

"I asked Mike to come and speak at a Trilogy Veterans Club meeting explained Michalak, who first met Reagan at the Redmond VFW Post 2995. We were packing 100 care packages for our troops in Iraq when the artist delivered drawings to two mothers whose sons had died in the war on terrorism. The VFW had planted a tree, along with a granite marker, for each of the men who had given the ultimate sacrifice and Mike wanted to be there to support their families.

"I saw first-hand how Mike's drawings of the fallen heros affects those who are left behind," he continued, "So when Reagan agreed to come and speak, we turned the event into a fundraiser to help with the costs for shipping these portraits all over the country and even the world."

Michalak and Reagan became friends and at a lunch that was attended by a number of veterans. Michalak asked Reagan if he had ever considered drawing portraits of the Polish soldiers who died as part of the allied forces in Iraq and Afghanistan.

"Two articles in the VFW magazine indicated that he had completed drawings of both Canadian and British soldiers," said Michalak. Reagan's response was yes, provided that Michalak did the footwork on finding the families. With the support of the Polish Home Assn. of Seattle, it took Michalak several months to get through to the right person at the Polish Embassy in Washington D.C, but eventually, with time and persistence, he prevailed.

"The Polish Embassy sent the request to the Polish Military and they approved the project," he said. "Now we are waiting to hear from the families of the men who gave their lives. I believe there are 42." An original portrait will be presented to each family and a digital copy will be made for the Military Museum in Warsaw.

About the Fallen Heroes Project

I met Reagan years ago when his project first started. He had a great job at the University of Washington in branding. He was known in the community for his generous donations of his sketches to charities to be sold at auction. His portraits hung in the homes of movie stars and famous politicians.

Reagan had served in the Marines during Vietnam and had been witness to some very tough sights. His homecoming, like many from that war, was not welcoming. Confused, he lost his wife and child in a divorce because of his depression and anger. He eventually found his way with his art, remarried, and was living a comfortable life in Edmonds, Washington.

Then one day the phone rang. A woman - whom he had never met - wanted to commission him to do a portrait. When he learned that the woman was a recent widow of a Marine killed in Iraq, he told her that he could not charge her.

When she received the drawing of her deceased husband, life changed for her. It was as if he had come home, she said. Word spread within the military community and soon Reagan was drawing more and more portraits. Each family reaching out to him, after they received their portrait, sharing how cathartic it was for them.

It wasn't long before Reagan felt compelled to take early retirement and devote himself to helping the families of the "Fallen Heros." "This project has never been about the politics of the war," said Reagan. "It has only been about one thing, thanking the families for

their sacrifice and letting them know that we all care." Reagan has given away 4,200 portraits. His 501c3, Fallen Heroes Project, exists to help pay for the framing and shipping charges that have to be covered. He has made no money from his drawings, but he has made a lot of friends.

"When I am drawing these servicemen and servicewomen, I often feel like they are in my studio with me," explained Reagan.

According to the official casualty list there have been 6,739 Fallen Heroes in the war in Iraq and Afghanistan. These figures do not include PTSD victims and those who come home physically broken in some way.

On Wednesday, March 25, 2015, Reagan was presented with the Congressional Medal Honor for his service in founding the nonprofit Fallen Heroes Project. He made the trip to Washington, DC for the ceremony which was held at Arlington National Cemetery.

If the Polish government decides on a ceremony for the presentation of the portraits, Michalak will make the trip to Poland on Reagan's behalf, so that the artist can continue to work in his studio. Michalak has already promised to escort the portraits to Poland to guarantee a safe delivery.

I recently asked Reagan if he will ever finish drawing the Fallen Heroes?

"Never, and the war isn't over. I get requests almost every day," said Reagan. Soon he will have 42 Polish soldiers to draw. "Terrorism will be here a long time; so will I."

My Own Story for a Lifetime: Pope Francis' Visit to Philadelphia

I am the product of a paint soaked brush, swirling together a multitude of colors on a white pallet - a blend of ethnicities, each with rich traditions I've adopted as my own. Despite my interests in each piece of the puzzle of my genetic makeup, I have the deepest appreciation for my Polish roots.

I was held as a newborn by a grandmother - whose eyes gleamed with tears every time she heard a good story or read a card sent to her by a friend - and whose home permanently held the scent of babka and kielbasa. I was baptized at St. Josephat's Church in Roxborough, PA, and my first favorite Christmas carol was Lulajze Jezuniu. I didn't do ballet and hip-hop like my best friends growing up. I, instead, learned Polish dancing every Saturday morning with my younger sister, as my mom and grandmom looked on stage with pride.

As a little girl, I can remember my grandmom, Helen Melnick, speaking fondly of the Pope (now Saint Pope John Paul II), as a good Polish man. My mom, AnneMarie Monachino, told me her fond memories of taking a bus to the seminary to see him when she was a kid. These stories stuck with me, and fostered a profound love for Jesus Christ, Poland and His Holiness early on.

Back in 2012, when I first heard whispers of an anticipated visit to the U.S. by Pope Francis, I felt a pull to participate. Having these stories from the two generations of women older and wiser than me, I wanted a story of my own. I craved to experience what they had shared with me all those years before. And so, I went.

The air was crisp, the sky cloudy, but the ground was dry. A perfect autumn morning, there was a 0% chance of rain Saturday and Sunday, and 80% predicted for Monday. Was it coincidence or divine intervention? I can't say, but there was no way it was going to rain on the Pope.

Everyone planned to meet at the Newman Center, the

Catholic Student Parish at West Chester University, at 8:30 a.m. There was a group of 45 students making the pilgrimage into Philadelphia to attend the Festival of Families and, crossed fingers and folded hands, catch a glimpse of His Holiness

Smiles stretched widely across my friends' faces as we boarded the bus to Paoli Station, iced coffee in one hand and Septa Papal Pass in the other. This was the beginning of a very long, very special day.

We arrived at the train station and were helped by kind Septa workers with warm demeanors who checked our tickets and waved us through. "Please say hi to the Pope for us!" a female employee exclaimed. "Sure thing," I replied with laughter.

I was taken aback by the sea of black and white habits occupying the waiting area outside. Thirty sisters traveled from Nashville to Philadelphia to see the Pope and shared their excitement with a few students. It's not every day that you see a large group of young, vibrant sisters out together and it stirred a curious excitement among anxiously waiting pilgrims.

Getting into the city was a breeze, even with the number of people we had. It seemed the media had blown it out of proportion, for which I was relieved. Some credited the smoothness of travel to God. I have to mention the Septa employees, security, and volunteers in playing a significant part as well.

We exited the train at the 30th Street Station and were greeted by a long line of porta-potties and street vendors, scattered and waiting for us to open our empty college pockets. After comparing prices and bargaining a little, I gave in and bought 2 small Vatican flags for a 2 for \$5 steal.

After a short walk to the security checkpoint, we approached and found a place in line. There were about five lanes to choose from and none were full. A couple from Idaho chatted with us for a few minutes. They couldn't say enough about how wonderful their week had been in Philly and how excited they were to welcome the Pontiff to town. Their cheerful grins were a comfort, and made me remember how lucky we were to live in such close proximity to the city.

Security moved quickly and before we knew it, we were towards the front of the line. I scanned the crowd and observed people taking urgent bites of apples, and quickly peeling oranges that had a vibrancy which popped against the surrounding gray buildings and overcast sky. "Anything you can throw," the secret service agent said, "Take everything out of your pockets, place your bag on the table, and turn all electronics on so we can check them, please."

The Logan Circle and Benjamin Franklin Parkway; however, were happily crowded. It was quite comfortable everywhere in the city to my surprise. When we did need to weave through crowds to keep up with the group. We were met mostly with nods of approval and forgiving smiles for bumping into each other

I showed my Festival of Families pass to a volunteer and entered the Festival Zone, where we found a nice, shaded area of steps to eat lunch and regroup on.

A young priest strolled over to our group and cracked a joke, "Hey, you guys, keep it down over here!" We chuckled. It was true. We were 45 students with our mouths stuffed with food. Little conversation

was taking place. The priest sat down close by and offered to hear confessions if anyone wished to attend. Many students took him up on the offer, and other priests followed in suit. Quiet conversations took place and sins were forgiven

We finished up lunch and moved closer together to pray a rosary on the steps humbly and quietly amidst the commotion of the festival. Throughout the rosary, a scent of roses overwhelmed us and it wasn't until after closing the prayer, after the smell had vanished, that someone mentioned the mysterious scent and everyone nodded in unison.

The morning blended into afternoon and the clouds dispersed and made room for the sun. We agreed that the gates were getting increasingly more crowded and we should find a place to wait for Pope Francis's parade. Besides, we didn't arrive eight hours early to stand behind crowds. We were set on getting a first-row view.

I picked up my bag and hung my camera around my neck as we rounded the parkway in search of some open space. It seemed impossible. The temperature rose and we found ourselves in the middle of a storm of people standing shoulder-to-shoulder moving only inches at a time.

After what felt like forever, we made our way out of the congestion and found a gate that stretched 50 feet with no one around. It was too good to be true. We parked our bodies along the fence, marking our territory.

Then, we waited. The Pope wasn't scheduled to come onto the parkway until after 7 p.m. It was 2 o'clock. We passed the time by playing cards and talking to friendly strangers. Students took turns swapping spots to make bathroom and food runs. The energy became increasingly livelier

Hours later, loud drums boomed from the Jumbo-Tron as the Pope walked out to the lectern at Independence Hall, from which Abraham Lincoln delivered the Gettysburg Address. He used his native Spanish language to speak on immigration and religious freedom. Unlike some of his earlier speeches in the U.S. where he used English, Pope Francis' speaking felt more natural, and there was a visible and contagious passion in his eyes for the subject on which he was preaching. The crowd roared and beamed at the overall glee. I thought back to my grandmom, and wondered how she was feeling while watching from the television at home.

The Pope closed his speech with an "Our Father." A soft, cool breeze awakened the hair on my arms, and all around me, thousands of bowed heads prayed together. Chills. Peace. A calming was shared in a fleeting moment that I hung onto for as long as it allowed me. Was this how my mother felt as a young girl with Pope John Paul II?

The waiting ensued, but felt appropriate. Patience was coming naturally to me today, by some miracle. The sun set behind the buildings and the sky turned from reds and oranges to a cool, dark blue. At 7:10 p.m., a line of black SUVs and motorcycles flooded the streets with flashing red and blue lights. Vatican flags whipped against the wind of the speeding vehicles to which they were attached. The papal parade had begun. Pope Francis was coming.

Bodies pushed against the gates. Others climbed onto walls and into trees to get a better view modern day Zacchaeuses. Cell phones and cameras acted as contemporary palm branches, our arms extended beyond the gate in front of us. I was blessed enough to be right against the gate, with no one to obstruct my view. I felt the sense of urgency and hopefulness surrounding me. People began to squeal and chant, "We love Francis!" and "Viva la papa!"

The Latino community was present in abundance, and I felt connected to them in a unique way, knowing this must have been what it was like for the Polish Americans when JPII visited

Then, the moment we had been waiting for all day had arrived and departed in a flash. Pope Francis rode by in his pope mobile. His vehicle was going fast, 25 mph I guessed, but I was able to catch the gleam in his eyes and sparkle in his smile. I watched him wave to children and families, without turning to face our side in the 8 seconds he was within reach. He was there and gone before I could process it.

The reaction came later, in the moments after being told the Pope wasn't doing another lap, and accepting that I had seen all that I would see of him tonight. My friend and I looked at each other and around at the rest of our peers' faces and broke into celebration, "We just saw the Pope. How many people can say that? We are so lucky."

As I tilted my head back, and raised my eyes to the night, I saw something significant. Above was darkened by clouds, but the moonlight was peeking through in just the right places to paint a cross, lit up in the sky.

I returned on Sunday morning, this time with my mom, Aunt Margaret and my cousin Kathryn. It was nice to experience the Pope's visit with the women who had inspired my faith from the beginning. My Aunt Margaret is my godmother, and a beautiful example to me as a Polish American Catholic. My mom was again seeing a Pope with her sister, and I with Kathryn, whom I am close enough to call a sister

Sunday's excitement matched Saturdays, but was slightly different. The mass of people was definitely larger in number, but everyone I encountered was patient and warm as they had been the previous day. The small details of how the day carried on meant the most. In line for security, this time taking 2 hours as opposed to 15 minutes, a group of sisters (the same order from Nashville coincidentally) sang hymns in a heavenly tune. The hundreds of waiting people in the crowd joined in, singing "Ave Maria" and "Here I Am. Lord."

Inside the parkway, we sat up on a grassy hill shaded by trees. During Mass, thousands of Christians knelt on the ground in solidarity, eyes raised to the altar and Jumbo-Trons. At the "Our Father" strangers joined hands, a connected chain of believers, and though Pope Francis said the Mass in Spanish, I felt God's presence all around.

Philadelphia was blessed to host the Pontiff for the World Meeting of Families. I was blessed to have obtained my own story, to have been in the presence of the successor of St. Peter, and to have participated in a Papal Mass with my family.

This is the story I will tell my children one day. I hope to instill in them a special love for the Pope, as my grandmother and mom did for me. I owe my faith to them, to PRCUA, and to God.

My favorite foods are still golabki and pierogi, I pray especially to the good Polish man, Saint John Paul II, and my grandmom still cries at a good story or a heartfelt card.



Chicago Ridge, IL - The Polish Museum of America's Autumn Dance was held on Saturday, October 10, 2015 at Glendora Banquets in Chicago Ridge, IL on the occasion of the 80th Anniversary of the PMA's founding. The event was organized jointly by the PMA and the PRCUA Polish Roman Catholic Union of America, who founded the Museum in 1935 and faithfully remains one of its main supporters.

The program opened with PMA President Richard Owsiany welcoming the guests. Short remarks were offered by PMA Chairman of the Board and PRCUA President Joseph A. Drobot, Jr., who also made a toast to the PMA. PMA Managing Director Malgorzata Kot said Grace before the dinner. PMA Vice Chair and PRCUA Vice President Micheline Jaminski was the Emcee for the evening.

Wesoly Lud Polish Folk Dance Company of the Polish Roman Catholic Union of America presented a short but lively dance performance, which was rewarded with the applause and many words of high praise from the audience.

Guests had a wonderful time dancing to the music by Mira Sojka-Topor & The Kings until the early morning hours.

The Polish Museum of America is one of the nation's first ethnic museums. It's mission is to collect, preserve, interpret and promote materials, artifacts and history that chronicle Polish history and the history of Polish-Americans.

The PMA was founded on October 15, 1935, at a plenary session of the PRCUA Board of Directors, when then PRCUA President Joseph Kania presented the idea of establishing the Archives and Museum of the Polish Roman Catholic Union of America. The proposal was approved by the Board of Directors. Joseph Kania appointed Mieczyslaw Haiman, a Polish American historian, to serve as the Museum's first curator.

The first public display area opened on January 12, 1937 in a specially designed and constructed room within the headquarters building of the PRCUA.

Over time, the Museum's collections expanded rapidly with numerous donations and aquisitions. Therefore, the PRCUA decided to convert its auditorium into the Museum's Great Hall of Exhibits, which was opened on October 9, 1939. In 1941, the Museum acquired two extremely valuable collections which contributed to its rapid expansion. First, was the collection of artifacts from the Polish Pavilion at the 1939 World's Fair in New York, which could not be returned to Poland after the outbreak of World War II and was partially purchased by the PRCUA Archives and Museum. The second collection consisted of Ignacy Jan Paderewski memorabilia, donated to the Museum by his sister, Antonina Wilkonska, after the death of the famous composer, pianist and statesman. In 1945, the Museum purchased a priceless Kosciuszko collection.

In 1971, the PRCUA Archives and Museum was incorporated as a not-for-profit organization in its own right (separate from the PRCUA) and changed its name to the Polish Museum of America.

In 1972, PRCUA VP Stella Nowak organized The Ladies Auxiliary of the PMA, which raised funds for renovations and the modernization of many rooms, among them the Art Gallery, which opened on May 10, 1973.

Walter L. Sojka and Sabina P. Logisz organized in 1979 the first Museum Summer Ball. This annual event is one of the main fundraisers for PMA operations.

In 1980 the Great Hall underwent general renovation.

On November 5, 2011, the renovated art gallery on the 4th floor reopened. Renamed the Stephen and Elizabeth Ann Kusmierczak Art Gallery, it presents a permanent exhibit of unique Interwar Period art.

Thanks to the other generous donations, on January 26, 2014, the new PMA Gift Shop on the first floor was opened and the main entrance to the PRCUA and PMA was dedicated. The remodeled Rare Book Room was blessed and opened on the PMA Library's 100th Anniversary on April 18, 2015.





Conservative Law and Justice back in power

WARSAW-The conservative Law and Justice (PiS) party in alliance with two small right-wing groupings has become the first political formation since the demise of communist rule in 1989 to be able to rule independently. It achieved the basic majority needed to form a government without coalition partners by winning 235 mandates in the 460-seat Sejm (lower house). Its less decisive victory in 2005 had forced Jarosław Kaczyński's party to team up with two nonetoo-compatible smaller parties and ultimately fall from power in snap elections two years later. (PiS is the abbreviation of "Prawo i Sprawiedliwość["] – Polish for Law and Justice.)

Official election results showed PiS winning 37.58% of the vote ahead of its chief rival, the Civic Platform (PO) with 24.09 support. Two small new groupings, the anti-system Kukiz-15 party of rock musician Paweł Kukiz (8.81%) and Nowoczesna (Modern) of hardnosed pro-market economist Ryszard Petru (7.6%) have made their parliamentary début. And the Peasant Party (Stronnictwo Ludowe -5.13%), which just barely cleared the 5% threshold, also made it into parliament.

"Polonia...looking back and looking ahead"

This past month, which happened to be Polish Heritage Month, found me involved with two different happenings which, when it came time to think of what to write about for this article, provided ample food for thought. They happened only two days apart and, as this article's title implies, gives all of us in the Polish community a chance to both look back and ahead in reflection.

The first event occurred on Oct. 10th in Krakow, Poland. The Very Rev. Canon Joseph L. Sredzinski, a priest of the Diocese of Greensburg, PA, making his twenty-something visit back to the land of his heritage (this time with high school classmates) died unexpectedly in his sleep. He was 71 years old and had been a priest for 45 years.

of several children who were all instilled with the culture, tradition, and faith which together make us who we are. He attended his local parish school, St. Joseph's, and then went on to St. Anthony High School in Watkins Glen, NY, before continuing his studies at St. Mary's College and Sts. Cyril and Methodius Seminary in Orchard Lake, MI.

He was ordained a priest on May 9, 1970 and, in addition to various parish and non-parochial assignments, served as the National Chaplain since 1981 of our fellow Polish fraternal organization, the Polish Falcons of American, on the Board of P.A.P.A. - the Polish American Priests' Association - and as organizer of the Polish Heritage Club in Uniontown. He hosted a local radio program in Pennsylvania for years. A significant recent achievement of his was serving as the initiator of the impressive and now annual Feast of Our Lady of Czestochowa celebrations in Pittsburgh's St. Paul Cathedral uniting the Polonia of western Pennsylvania from that diocese as well as the Dioceses of Greensburg and Altoona-Johnstown. He was recognized for his service to Polonia by being named an honorary canon of the Archdiocese of Lublin, Poland, in 2007.

But, such statistics don't capture the essence of the man. Fr. Joe was alive with a true Polishpriestly soul. Happy and exuberant to see the many people who called him friend, he was quick with a kind word and engaging smile. He humbly helped many and energetically and joyfully promoted the faith as well as the beauty and significance of our Polish culture and tradition. A man of seemingly boundless energy, he also bore his share of wrongs patiently and, reflective of his strong spirituality and relationship with the Lord, exuded a true joy that would leave you happy to be alive - and happy to have been in his company.

His loss leaves a significant hole in Pennsylvania Polonia and beyond. It leads us to ask, though... After such a productive life, where is the person inspired enough to take his place? Where is the next busy person who will bother to make the time because the cause of Polonia is a significant enough priority to carry on these tasks?

This leads to the next event, which occurred on Oct. 12th in Chicago. At the invitation of Bp. Andrew Wypych, it's director, I attended a planning/reorganization meeting of the Catholic League for Religious Assistance to Poland and Polonia which was held at the P.R.C.U.A. headquarters and was well attended by representatives of Chicago Polonia.

The purpose was to solicit opinions from among those active in the Polish community as to how best move this venerable organization forward. As we know, it was founded to offer direct aid and relief to a Poland first ravaged by war and then communist tyranny. However, the restoration of a truly free Poland has, naturally, changed things. There do remain true needs, but they are not the same as before. Also, given this fact, the question was raised as to how the organization can also now work to promote and support Polonia in this country, as well.

Needless to say, there were various opinions for every possibility put forth, but one in particular was pronounced: How do we get and keep people involved in the important work of Polonia? Naturally, we look to the younger generation to do so. But, where are they and why not in the numbers of their predecessors?

It was pointed out with satisfaction that many of our Polish organizations annually award scholarships to deserving candidates - but that we then never see many of them again. Is it time to adjust things? Things like the amount offered in a scholarship. Fifty years ago a \$500 scholarship was significant. Now, it doesn't even pay for books for a semester! Should fewer scholarships be given out but of greater value to make a more significant impact? If so, then competition would be greater but so would the prestige of the award. Of course, the criteria would necessarily have to be adjusted as well. In addition to everything else, would the scholarship winner then be judged based less on whose family they belong to but, rather, say on whether they have been involved in Polonia or not. Have they been active in our cultural groups, language and dance schools, sports programs, parishes, etc.? If they may live where there is not an active Polonia, have they shown participation in community service and a willingness for giving back? Wouldn't it be more likely to expect people to remain involved or committed if they already have been than expect them to somehow wake up at some future date and become a part of something pretty much foreign to them?

These are just some of the thoughts...But, I think we can all see how the two fit together. How many more people can we loose who seemingly cannot be replaced before we work to adjust things and make an organized effort to ensure they will be? I would encourage all of our readers to reflect upon this. Bring it up in discussion at the various meetings of the organization in which you participate. Encourage healthy adjustments to meet the needs of the times. Don't wait for someone else to do it...be part of the progress yourself!!!

IN MEMORIAM

Just as I was writing this article, I learned of the sudden passing of Msgr. Peter W. Zendzian, a priest of the Diocese of Brooklyn and Pastor of St. Matthias Church in Ridgewood, NY, at the age of 63. In my view, he was a true giant in his service to Polonia and the Church, a priest's-priest, and a true and valuable friend.

May Canon Joseph Sredzinski, Msgr. Peter Zendzian, and all our deceased priestly servants of Polonia, rest in peace.

Z tej okazji odbyła się w sobotę, 10 października 2015 roku w Glendora Banquets w Chicago Ridge, IL, Zabawa jesienna MPA, zorganizowana wspólnie przez MPA i Zjednoczenie Polskie Rzymsko-Katolickie w Ameryce, które było założycielem muzeum w 1935 roku i do chwili obecnej pozostaje jednym z jego głównych sponsorów.

Uczestników zabawy powitał ciepło prezes MPA Richard Owsiany. Krótkie przemówienie wygłosił prezes zarządu ZPRKA i przewodniczący Rady Dyrektorów MPA Joseph A. Drobot, Jr., który wzniósł również toast za pomyślność tej instytucji. Dyrektor zarządzający MPA Małgorzata Kot odmówiła krótką modlitwę przed kolacją po polsku, a sekretarz-skarbnik ZPRKA, po agnielsku. Muzeum Polskie w Ameryce jest jednym z najstarszych i najwiekszych muzeów etnicznych w Stanach Zjednoczonych. Jego misją jest gromadzenie i ochrona cennych dokumentów i pamiątek polskiego dorobku kulturalnego, promocja zgromadzonych materiałów historycznych oraz umożliwianie społeczeństwu amerykańskiemu poznania i zrozumienia naszej narodowej egzystencji.

MPA zostało założone w dniu 15 października 1935 roku, na plenarnym zebraniu zarządu ZPRKA, w czasie którgo ówczesny prezes ZPRKA Joseph Kania przedstawił ideę utworzenia Archiwum i Muzeum Zjednoczenia Polskiego Rzymsko-Katolickiego w Ameryce. Wniosek został zatwierdzony przez Radę Dyrektorów. Józef Kania mianował Mieczysława Haimana, polonijnego historyka, na stanowisko pierwszego kustosza muzeum.

Pierwsze sale wystawiennicze otwarte zostały w dniu 12 stycznia 1937 roku w specjalnie zaprojektowanym i skonstruowanym pomieszczeniu w budynku ZPRKA.

Z biegiem czasu, zbiory muzeum rozszerzyły się szybko dzięki licznie napływającym darowiznom i nabywanym materiałom. Dlatego też ZPRKA postanowiło przekształcić salę balową ZPRKA w Wielką Salę Muzeum, w której miały być wystawiane eksponaty i kolekcje. Sala została otwarta w dniu 9 października 1939 roku. W 1941 roku Muzeum otrzymało dwa niezwykle cenne zbiory, które przyczyniły się do jego szybkiego rozwoju. Pierwszy był zbiór artefaktów z Polskiego Pawilonu na Wystawie Światowej z 1939 roku w Nowym Jorku, które z powodu wybuchu II wojny światowej nie mogły powrócić do kraju i zostały częściowo zakupione przez Archiwum i Muzeum ZPRKA. Druga kolekcja składająca się z pamiątek po słynnym kompozytorze, pianiście i polityku, Ignacym Janie Paderewskim, przekazana została do muzeum przez jego siostrę, Antoninę Wilkońską, po śmierci wielkiego mistrza. W 1945 roku Muzeum zakupiło bezcenny zbiór Kościuszki.

W roku 1971, Archiwum i Muzeum ZPRKA zostały zarejestrowane jako niezależna instytucja "non-profit" (oddzielona od ZPRKA) i jako taka zmieniła nazwę na Muzeum Polskie w Ameryce.

W 1972 roku, wiceprezeska ZPRKA Stella Nowak zorganizowała Koło Pomocnicze Pań MPA, które zbierało fundusze na remonty i modernizacje wielu sal muzealnych i utworzenie Galerii Sztuki, która została otwarta 10 maja 1973 r.

Walter L. Sojka i Sabina P. Logisz zorganizowali 16 lipca 1979 r. pierwszy Bal Letni Muzeum. Ta coroczna impreza jest jedną z głównych form zbierania funduszy na działalność muzeum.

W 1980 roku Wielka Sala MPA została poddana generalnemu remontowi. 5 listopada 2011 roku otwarta została, całkowicie odnowiona galeria sztuki na 4 piętrze, pod nazwą Galeria Sztuki im. Stephena i Elizabeth Ann Kusmierczak. Galeria prezentuje stałą wystawę unikalnych dzieł sztuki z okresu międzywojennego.

Dzięki kolejnym hojnym darowiznom został całkowicie wyremontowany nowy sklepik z upominkami na parterze budynku oraz główne wejście do ZPRKA i MPA, uroczyście otwarte w dniu 26 stycznia 2014 roku. W dniu w dniu 18 kwietnia 2015 r. w 100. rocznicę Biblioteki MPA, został poświęcony i otwarty wyremontowany nowy pokój starych druków.
